New York, Aug. 28.—New York sporting men are at odds on several points concerning the one overshadowing event in the world of the fighting men; the lightweight championship battle between Joe Gana, holder of the title, and Battling Nelson, the conqueror of all other aspirants for the honor. The points on which they agree are these:

The fight will be on the level. Gans would not dare to fake before such a crowd as will gather about the ring at Goldfield, even if he wished to, and inducements were held out to him to lay down.

The men will make the weight and be fit to fight for a king's ransom when they enter the ring, bar accidents.

It will be the greatest lightweight battle of modern times and will settle absolutely the question of the lightweight championship.

On these points there is no difference of opinion, but there is a very wide divergence when it comes to picking the winner. There are experts whe can dope out nothing but Gans as an easy winner. Others whose judgment is entitled to equal consideration can figure nothing to it but the Dane. On the whole, the weight of opinion leans toward Gans, and in the betting he probably will have the call so far as New York is concerned. The way things look now, however, there will be a dollar of wise money for Neison for every one for Gans.

The championship games are to be held at Travers Island on September 7 and 8. All the local athletes will undoubtedly be entered. Nigel C. Baker, Australian, has forwarded his entry from London, England, and President P. Görman of the Canadian Amateur Athletic association says that a strong team of Canadian athletes will also enter and compete.
