Two special trains loaded with strikebreakers left Jersey City at 10:30 o'clock last night on the Lehigh Valley road for San Francisco. It is estimated that there were 800 men on the two trains, which had 10 cars each.

On each car were four of Farley's detectives armed with clubs like the night sticks carried by policemen. The detectives carried other things to dissuade men, who were so inclined from deserting. Every preparation has been made to feed the men on the trip to prevent any unnecessary delay in setting to the coast. Great quantities of cooked food were put on the train. The beer supply, consisting of 5:00 bottles, was on hand to stave off thirst. There were 500 tin cups for them to drink out of. Precautions were taken to beep things as quiet as possible. The men were taken over to Jersey City in special ferry boats.

Many of the men went without a change of ciothing, and there are indications that there was great hurry in getting them off. Some of the men, it was said, had to notify their families by wire that they were off on a long trip.

Arrangements have been made by Farley, it is understood, to start enother batch for San Francisco early this morning.

TWO-CENT FARES TO BE CALIFORNIA ISSUE

Los Angeles, Aug. 28.—An organized movement has been started here to bring before both state conventions of Republicans and Demograts a demand for a 2-cent railroad fare. Leaders propose to make it an issue in the state campaign, similar to the successful effort in Ohio. It is believed that it will be the leading issue in the legislative as well as in the governorable contest.
