WILL REMOVE PRESENT ONE-STORY BUILDING

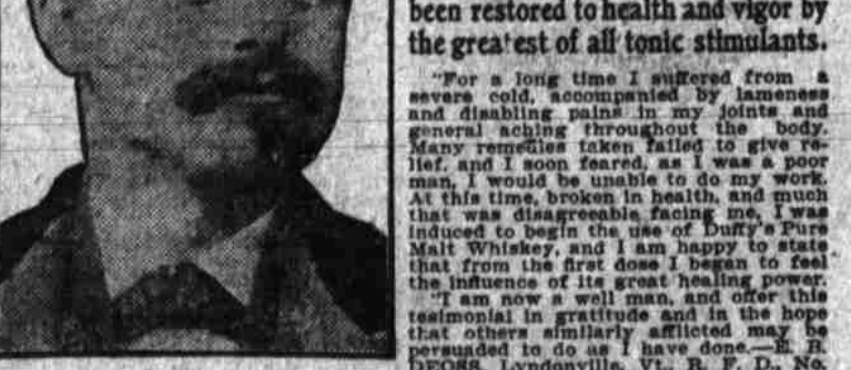
