International Secretary C. S. Ward Tells How Congested Conditions May Be Relieved.

UNDERTAKERS ASK TO BE DEPUTIES

Desire Bill Passed by Legislature Making Them All Assistant Health Officers.

To act in cooperation with the city and county health officers of the state, the members of the Oregon Funeral Directors' association wish a bill passed by the next session of the legislature which will appoint them deputy health officers.

No compensation from the county or state is expected by the undertakers.

No compensation from the county or state is expected by the undertakers. They declare that the nature of their business brings them into knowledge of the true facts existing in cases of contagious diseases, and they are positive they will be of material benefit to the regular health officers in running down the causes for infection and contagion. If this bill is passed a number of the regulations of the state board of health will become laws. At present, for instance, there is no quarantine law in Oregon and all attempts to enforce a quarantine are done simply by persuasion and sometimes a little bluffing.

A special committee has been appointed by the association to draft this bill and have it introduced to the legislature. At the last session such a bill was introduced, but the undertakers did not unanimously call for its passage and it died on the table.

The association has just ended its second annual convention. Besides the election of officers as announced yesterday, A. L. Finley and S. N. Wilkins were appointed delegates to the national convention which meets at St. Louis next year.
