

# CHANGES MADE AT WALLA WALLA

Number of New Educators  
Added to Faculty of Whitman  
College This Year.

Whitman College, Walla Walla, Wash., Sep. 14.—A number of changes have been made in the college teaching force this year and already the new professors are settling to their work in college. The great changes have been made in the Conservatory of Music which is now well equipped with an efficient corps of teachers.

Professor Lovewell, who has been director and head of the piano department for many years has left and his place is taken by Professor Robert L. Schofield. Mr. Schofield has been professor of piano forte and theory of music at the Broad Street Conservatory of Music of Philadelphia for three years and comes to Whitman highly recommended.

Mr. Archibald C. Jackson, formerly teacher of voice in the Baptist University for Women in South Carolina, the possessor of a sweet baritone voice, takes Professor Pennell's place at the head of the vocal department. Miss Harriet Young, who graduated from the Conservatory last year, has been engaged as assistant in the piano department.

In the college department Professor Anderson head of the Greek department will spend the year abroad partly in Egypt and partly in Italy. His place will be taken by Professor C. J. Todd, who holds a master's degree from Harvard.

In the English department all of the work in rhetoric will be taken by Professor Norman E. Coleman; A. M. of Harvard.

Mrs. Wylie will continue as dean of women and head of the Bible department having returned from a six months' trip to Palestine. Miss Helen L. Burr of Abbot Academy, Massachusetts will take her place, however, as dean of Reynolds hall.

Mr. James Gilbreath, who completed the college course last year, has also been engaged as an assistant in the department of mathematics. The first class work was begun yesterday and soon the college will be working steadily along the regular lines.

## JUDGES TO DRAW STRAWS TO DECIDE TERMS

California Law Forbids Gambling  
but Provides Game of  
Chance.

Journal Special Service, San Francisco, Sep. 14.—The state law forbids gambling, yet it provides for a little game of chance whereof the prizes are respectively \$6,000, \$50,000 and \$28,000.

This was the question propounded in Presiding Judge Graham's court. He referred to the provision of the statute whereby the legislature, failing to decide this fall must draw lots to decide the length of their terms.

"It sounds like a little joke," continued Judge Graham, "but it is not. Three judges of the court of appeals must be elected this year, one to serve 13, another eight, and the third four years. The first receives \$64,000 salary, the second \$56,000, and the third \$28,000."

The law does not actually provide that these three appellate judges shall shake dice for the bigger purse, but why the question should not be settled that way as well as by drawing straws I can't see.

"And yet there is a law against gambling."

## TEDDY'S SIXTH YEAR AS PRESIDENT BEGINS

It was on September 14, 1901, that Mr. Roosevelt took the oath of office. On the preceding day the attention of the whole world was centered on Milburn house at Buffalo, from which bulletins were issued in the afternoon announcing that President McKinley was sinking. Vice-President Roosevelt, who, like his predecessor, had been born in New York, was in the afternoon at 10:15 in the West Wing of the White House, where he had been staying since his arrival from Oyster Bay, to attend the annual meeting of the National Governors' Association. He had been invited to speak at the opening session of the meeting.
