(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, Sept. 25.—J. C. Stubbbs, chairman of the executive officers' committee for the railroads, has prepared the following report regarding doubtful points in the new rate law:

Free transportation cannot be given to land or immigration agents unless they employ in such cases that the carriers legally could give them transportation.

There is no authority in law for making lower rates to landseekers and settlers than for other travelers. This interpretation seems to abolish the homeseekers' excursions, which all western lines have been running for years.

Advertisements. The law committee advises that transportation cannot be issued in payment for advertising. It is generally accepted, however, that carriers may carry an open account with publishers and that publishers may carry an open account with carriers for advertising.

Special reduced rates may be made for federal and state troops and officers and employees of the United States Geological Survey, and reclamation service in the future as in the past.

Free Lites Out Off. The words of the law excepting "inmates of hospitals and charitable and eleemosynary institutions and persons engaged in charitable and missionary work from the free pass prohibition are held not to apply to doctors, nurses and other employees."

Nuns, sisters of charity, missionaries, national or state officers of religious organizations, teachers and pupils in Indian schools, etc., are held to be discriminated against under the party rate rule, the report says.

Army Favors Illegal. Special rates for army and naval officers and their families, which always have been made with discriminating express and steamship companies, but not with telegraph and telephone companies. It is held that free transportation may not be issued to members of railroad employees' unions who are not in the employ of a railroad company.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept. 25.—The University of Oregon opened its doors to its students yesterday for the year 1906-07 with better prospects than at any previous time in its history.

Thousands of dollars worth of equipment have been added, new instructors provided and the largest attendance of any previous year is expected.

The freshmen class will in all probability be a third or a half larger than last year, when it numbered over 300. Fifty-four or perhaps one-third of the students will be from Portland, the students of that city seeming to have taken a decided liking for Oregon this year.

The old students are expected to be back to resume their work within a week. This year, too, the faculty is very strong, there being three new professors of considerable note in the languages, the engineering department are also two new instructors.

Added Equipment. The great step forward this year is not so much in the faculty as in the laboratories and shops, where thousands of dollars of new apparatus has been placed.

On the campus the changes are also apparent, fresh paint and new facings vying with each other for predominance. Work on the new \$25,000 library is under way and by next spring that structure and the girls' gymnasium will be finished.

TOUR OF AMERICA COSTS FIFTEEN HATS. Youth Also Spends One Dollar in Money on Six Months Trip Over Country.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) New London, Conn., Sept. 25.—Fifteen hats and \$1 in money is the sum total of the cost of a transcendent journey for John E. Watrous, an 18-year-old New London lad, who has just landed here.

The hats were lost en route jumping freights and riding blind baggage while the money was spent tipping workmen and buying ice cream. His ocean was secured by devious methods on route.

Watrous worked his way up the coast from Los Angeles to Portland, Oregon, where he worked five days driving a milk route, a change from logging in the Siskiyou county. He hiked from Portland to Seattle and made side trips to Salt Lake, suite, Billings and Sheridan, then came overland, dropping off at various points in St. Paul, Minneapolis, Chicago, Indianapolis, Cleveland and Buffalo. He had a good time and spent four months on the trip.

HARVARD'S NEW MEDICAL COLLEGE IS DEDICATED. Cambridge, Mass., Sept. 25.—The first half of a two-days' program of exercises in connection with the dedication of the new medical school of Harvard University was held today.

The exercises were brief and were carried out in the grand court of the magnificent new buildings which adorn the Back Bay Penn. President Eliot of the university presided at the act of dedication. More formal and interesting exercises will be held in Sanders' theatre tomorrow. More than 1,000 graduates of the Harvard Medical school, including prominent physicians from all parts of the country, have gathered to take part in the celebration.

WESTWARD HO ISLAND IS OFFERED FOR SALE. (Journal Special Service.) London, Sept. 25.—Lundy Island, with which the reading public has become familiar by Charles Kingsley's popular novel entitled "Westward Ho," was put up for sale at public auction in London today.

The island is situated in the Bristol channel, is about three miles long and has an average width of about half a mile. For the last 70 years it has been in the possession of the Heaven family, which acquired it in 1284 for £15,000. It was purchased at as many times that figure at the present time.

(Journal Special Service.) Trenton N. J., Sept. 25.—The political contest that is being fought out in the state primaries today has stirred New Jersey from Cape May to the New York state line. The contest is one of the most interesting and exciting that this state has seen in years.

The Republican party is divided into two hostile factions, very much as the party is divided in Wisconsin. The "stalwarts" in New Jersey this year are called "regulars" and the "half-breeds" are known as "Colbyites," "reformers" or "new idea" men.

The "regulars" or organization Republican leaders comprise pretty much all the office-holders—Governor Stokes and other statehouse officials, United States Senators Keen and Dryden, and all the Representatives in congress from this state.

Colby Leads Reformers. The reformers, as the other faction are pleased to call themselves, are led by three men who have for the past two or three years been conspicuous figures in New Jersey politics.

These are equal taxation and limited franchises. The reformers claim that the railroads are paying a ridiculously unequal share of the taxes. They are two principal planks in the reform platform. These are equal taxation and limited franchises.

The two factions fight it out at the primaries today. The reformers have put George L. Brown forward as their candidate for United States Senator while the regulars are generally for John F. Dryden, who has served part of one term in the senate and desired re-election.

What both factions seem to fear is that neither will honestly abide by the result of the primaries, but will secretly knife the ticket that wins in the primaries at the coming election.

On the assembly which was held at 57,978 vitality, it is believed to be within the possibilities that the Democrats may capture the legislature this year and elect the reformer. Former President Grover Cleveland has been talked of as a possible candidate for the senate, but those best familiar with the situation believe it would be impossible to persuade him to become a candidate.

Must Tell Your Height in Order to Cast Vote. Boston, Mass., Sept. 25.—The man who undertook to run on somebody else's name at the primaries in this city today had to run more of a gauntlet than heretofore, for, in addition to having the name called out by the precinct officer when he asked for a ballot, the precinct officer also announced the height of the man whose name had been called. Then the police officer on duty at the polling booth looked over his descriptive list of voters to see if the man who had called for a ballot answered the description against that name on the descriptive list. This was only putting into effect the new state law governing elections.
