Portland Leaders Take Second Contest From Seals in a Close Match.

## PITCHER GUM PUZZLES SAN FRANCISCO NINE

Uphill Battle Is Won in Extra Inning on a Base on Balls, Mitchell's Drive and Walthour's Slow Fielding—Giants May Take Series.

(Journal Special Service.) Oakland, Sept. 23.—The Giants continued their good work yesterday by defeating the Seals in a close ten-inning affair, 3 to 1. Gum was on the firing line for the Portlanders, and had Wilson's men guessing throughout. The Seals were the first to break into the run column. In the second inning Irwin was given life on an easy chance that Smith and Sweeney didn't go after, and scored when Sweeney threw the ball a mile in fielding Walthour's drive. From the way Welch was retiring the Giants it looked as if he would record a shutout, but those who reckoned that way had another guess. In the seventh inning with two giants buried, Donahue touched up Welch for a single, and Pete Lester came along with a three-base hit and scored the Portland catcher. There was nothing more doing until the tenth, when Welch became unsteady and passed Bill Sweeney. James McKale died promptly. Mitchell smashed one to right field, and before Walthour fielded it, Sweeney had crossed the plate with the deciding tally.

General William E. Finser, who returned from the east several days ago, told of the visit of the relatives of the illustrious American to the camp of the soldier boys of Oregon.

"Mrs. Clark is a very bright old lady," said General Finser this morning, "and showed a great deal of interest in the Oregon boys and their success in the shoot. She also inquired closely regarding Oregon affairs, and regretted that she was unable to attend the exposition given in Portland last year. She explained that her absence from the fair was unavoidable and due to the fact that Miss Voorhis was taken ill while preparing her wardrobe for the trip, and that the rest of the party were stayed from the journey because of this fact.
