

### BRYAN'S TOUR OF SOUTH ENDS

Large Crowds Everywhere Enthusiastically Welcomed Great Commoner.

### STILL HOLDS HIS PLACE IN SOUTHERN HEARTS

References to Government Ownership Cheered in Oklahoma—Roosevelt Praised and Shaw and Hitchcock Grilled.

(Journal Special Service.) Kansas City, Kas., Sept. 24.—W. J. Bryan has finished his speaking tour of the south and southeast. Everywhere immense crowds greeted the Nebraskan, who was cordially and enthusiastically welcomed throughout his long journey, showing conclusively that the commoner still retains his place in the hearts of the people of the south, despite his championship of public ownership, which has antagonized many of the political leaders. Hoarse and husky from his many speeches, Mr. Bryan arrived here today from Oklahoma, where he spoke last night and yesterday.

**At Oklahoma City.**  
At Oklahoma City 15,000 people greeted Bryan. Chief Pleasant Porter of the Creek tribe of Indians introduced Mr. Bryan, who, during the address, complimented President Roosevelt upon the settlement of the coal strike and effecting peace between two warring nations.

Discussing the probable candidates for the Republican nomination for the Presidency, he scored Secretaries L. M. Shaw and E. A. Hitchcock, and referred the change in sentiment from that of ten years ago to but one man, whom he declared the Republicans were again urging to become a third-term candidate. He pleaded for the adoption of the eight-hour-day law, for a board of arbitration, the initiative and referendum, and closed with an appeal to the laboring men to support the Democratic nominee in the congressional campaign.

**Owner Public Ownership.**  
At El Reno Mr. Bryan addressed a crowd of several thousand people from the rear platform shortly before midnight.

At Guthrie an enthusiastic welcome was given Mr. Bryan. The Nebraskan devoted half an hour to an address in which he merely touched on national issues. He criticized the administration when he mentioned the carpet-bagger in politics, and warned the voters of Oklahoma against railroad influence in the constitutional convention. A notable feature was the great cheer that greeted the reference to his government railroad ownership proposition.

Mr. Bryan talked from the observation car of a special Santa Fe train, arriving at 7 o'clock from Perry, Oklahoma, having made 11 speeches.

At Tulsa Mr. Bryan was greeted by 5,000 persons. He was introduced by former Oregon Chief of Police Palmer, and spoke for 10 minutes. Several Indian chiefs besides Palmer were on the platform. The Nebraskan also spoke at Vinita, Chelsea, Claremont, and at other points on his trip northward.

### FORMER CONSUL BUICK IS DEAD

Roseburg Man Who Represented America at Soneberg, Germany, Passes Away.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., Sept. 23.—Hon. D. S. K. Buick, a pioneer of the Pacific coast and for 30 years a resident of Roseburg, died here last evening at the age of 79 years.

Mr. Buick was commissioner for Douglas county at the Lewis and Clark exposition last year. He was at one time editor of the Plaindealer of this place and served for some time as consul at Soneberg, Germany, under President Harrison's administration.

He was also a past grand patriarch of the encampment, I. O. O. F., of Oregon and a prominent member of the First Presbyterian church of this place.

### POPULAR YOUNG COUPLE MARRIED AT BAKER CITY

Castie; welcoming address, Professor O. V. White; piano duet, Mrs. Gertrude Fisher and Miss Sheak; reading, Miss Gertrude Johnson; vocal duet, Mrs. Gertrude Fisher and Professor Goodrich.

The faculty for the coming year is as follows: Professor J. C. Goodrich, late of Riverside, California, mathematics; Professor Greenleaf of McKeaysport, Pennsylvania, head of the commercial department; Professor O. V. White, science; Miss Teresa McDonald, lan-

guage; Miss Gertrude Johnson, elocution; Mrs. Ethel White, piano; Mrs. McConnell, late of Grants Pass, art department, and Miss Edith Sheak, vocal department.

The college has organized a normal department this year and teachers attending will receive the 36 months' credit on final examinations for teachers' certificates, the same as is credited on the State normal.

Professor O. V. White was elected dean of the faculty for the coming year.
