could now be unloaded promptly. This embargo, he said, would be raised at once and the usual quantity of wheat will be flowing into Portland by the first part of next week.

last Tuesday night and the firm stand taken by Chief of Police Grismacher against such men going armed is said to have caused the discharge of the majority of the armed guards. At Montgomery dock No. 1, for example, there are now only three private watchmen besides two policemen, guarding against possible attacks by strikers, and the

strikes on the whole has assumed a peaceful aspect. The strikers themselves have so far given no evidence that they would do violence of any kind. The dock district is thoroughly picketed, but no attempts whatever are made to trespass on forbidden ground. Several strike-breakers

who have been approached by the pickets and urged not to work stated to a Journal representative today that they had not been threatened in any way, that they had merely been told of the circumstances of the strike and had been requested to refrain from talking the strikers' places.
