Five jurors had been accepted at noon today in Judge Gantenbein's department of the circuit court to hear the suit of R. F. Hoeking for \$5,000 damages from the Portland Consolidated Railway company. It is alleged Hoeking is using as administrator of the estate of Jerome J. Sullivan, who died August 20, 1928, Hoeking alleges that Sullivan and Newton Kirk were driving on Powell street in a buggy on the afternoon of August 23 last, when a Brooklyn car came down Powell street at a high rate of speed and struck the buggy. It is claimed that Sullivan's death was caused by the accident. The railway company alleges that the man was driving a high-tempered young horse that became frightened at the car and started across the track in front of it. The car was being driven at a slow rate of speed, says the company.

BAILIFF WILL GET HIS SALARY

Mayor Lane Signs McDonald's Pay Warrant and Money is Harried Over.

CULMINATION OF SUIT IS STILL IN DOUBT

Warrant is for June Salary—Wages for July, August and September Have Not Yet Been Paid—Case May Go to Supreme Court.

Mayor Lane has signed the \$75 salary warrant of James McDonald, bailiff of the municipal court, and the warrant is now in the possession of McDonald's attorney, John F. Logan. The warrant was filed in the circuit court by Attorney Montague and Greene, in lieu of a bond for an appeal to the supreme court, and this morning Attorney Logan secured an order from Judge Gantenbein directing that the warrant be delivered to McDonald.

The famous decision of Judge Gantenbein declaring that the council had power to create offices and appoint incumbents was the outcome of the suit brought by McDonald to compel the mayor to sign salary warrants. Mayor Lane had objected to signing it because he believed the council was infringing his rights of appointment. When the ordinance creating the position of bailiff of the municipal court, and appointing McDonald to the office was passed the mayor vetoed it. The council then passed it over the mayor's veto and McDonald went to work. When pay day came the mayor refused to sign the warrant for McDonald's salary, and the suit to compel the signature followed.

FOUNTAINS ON NEW LAMP POSTS

City Authorities Will Allow Merchants to Put in Drinking Cups if They Desire.

This water faucet and drinking cup is attached to the new ornamental light post in a privilege that will probably be allowed by the city authorities to the merchants who are erecting these electrolights.

In a few months a dozen or more of these posts will be on the most prominent corners of the business district. There has been talk of water fountains for some time, but nobody has been forced to step over any thus far. Only a few will be placed at the most important corners. The general movement to give the downtown streets a better appearance by night and by day, the light committee of the executive board has agreed to pay for the lights on these posts if the lights and the attendant ugly pole can be abolished. One has already been put up in front of the Breeden building at Third and Washington. The Oregon hotel, Tull & Gibbs, Ben Selling, A. E. Steinhack and company, the United States National bank and others are considering the erection of similar posts.
