NOTE ASKED ON VETO OF MAYOR LANE

Public May Be Given a Chance to Show Whether His Policy Is Sustained

Non-Exclusive Charter, Lawyers Say, Does Not Allow Roads to Enter City on Hill Tracks, and Other Cuts Across Peninsula May Be Expected.

Mayor Lane's overruled veto of the Portland & Seattle Railroad company's franchise granting exclusive rights of way for the proposed cut through the streets across the peninsula is being wilyly discussed at the time limit of the referendum on the question draws near. It is said that if the mayor's veto, which was overridden by the council, is not sustained by the people the result some day will be another gash through the peninsula and another bridge across the Willamette river in Portland to admit a desired railway line—possibly the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul—fringe the north or east.

What Lawyers Say. In some quarters it has been believed that the government grant of a non-exclusive charter for the new railway bridge carried with it the implied right for any other railroad company to use not only the bridge but the tracks forming the approach to the bridge. Lawyers say this is not a correct assumption and that the next railroad to be built across the peninsula will have to make another gash across the peninsula to reach the Hill lines at this point.

FRISCO CHINESE ORGANIZE UNION OF LAUNDRYMEN

Oriental Prepare to Strike for Higher Wages—Want Fifteen Dollars a Week Instead of Ten Now Received—Threaten to Go to Cleaning Bricks.

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—The Hethen Chinese has a stronger card up his sleeve than Best Harts ever dreamed of. He is going to form a union and play four some on the brick breaker. The latest move is the strike breaker. A Chinese laundryman's lodge, which was formed a few days ago, and practically every "Chink" who wields a flatiron or rubs a shirt in a charter member of the organization. They all are out for an advance in wages, and they are going to get it or else the Chinese laundry industry will have to fall by the wayside. The best flatiron mechanics who are doing \$15 a week, instead of \$10, while the less skilled Chinese, who are wont to bent over the tubs have notified their bosses that they will not work unless their wages are raised from \$7 and \$8 to \$9 and \$10 a week. So the boss laundrymen are up in the air and possessed of a bad feeling. They are religiously making the rounds of their customers' houses and telling them that prices must go up for the employees are determined to secure higher wages, so in order to make the business pay the wash tariff will have to be increased.

STATE OF OHIO SCORES AGAINST BIG OIL TRUST

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DOCKS ARE INVADDED BY UNION MEN

Police Stand By While Strikers Hurl Threats and Cries of "Scab" at Workmen

First Unlawful Act of Grain-handlers' Strike Proves Inability of Police to Prevent Trespass and Possible Violence to Nonunion Men.

The first unlawful act authentically reported in the waterfront strikes occurred this morning. Fifty striking grainhandlers invaded the premises of the exporters, brushed aside the policemen on guard, clambered onto the docks, marched through them in a body and hurled threats and opprobrious epithets at the strike-breakers at work.

The invasion began at about 10 o'clock a.m. at three docks were trespassed upon: Oceanic dock, Montgomery No. 2, and Columbia No. 2. In each case the gang was met by policemen, who warned the intruders to keep away from the docks. The managers of the docks in each case appealed to the policemen to do their duty, but the policemen were evidently completely covered, as no attempt was made to arrest any of the trespassers. The incident showed the absolute inability of the police guard to serve the purpose for which they were assigned. Had the strikers been inclined to do any violence to the strike-breakers they could have done it.

Indignant at Police. Manager A. J. Burns of Balfour, Guthrie & Co., who is also publicity agent for the exporters' association, expressed himself extremely indignant at the inaction of the police.

The second grain ship to begin loading with nonunion labor was the German ship Narvald, at 7 o'clock this morning, under the direction of Eben & McCabe, the crew of the Narvald began putting wheat into her at the Pacific Coast Elevator dock. It was thought that the steamship Hessel Dollar might begin loading today at Montgomery dock No. 2, but the lack of nonunion stevedores caused her to remain idle. The work of preparing the other grain ships now in the harbor for loading is not being hurried, for the fact is known that it will not be an easy matter to get nonunion stevedores. The stevedores of the Generalve Melinos was finished last night, and she was transferred to another dock to finish loading her import cargo.

CHANGE COLOR OF ARMY UNIFORMS TO OLIVE GREEN

In Face of Enemy, Uncle Sam's Troops Are to Be as Inconspicuous as Possible—New Color Will Merge Into All Landscapes at Short Distance Away.

Washington, Oct. 12.—In the face of the enemy Uncle Sam's soldiers are to be as inconspicuous as possible. They are not intended to be more largely for hostile bullets and to the end that they may be afforded all the protection that a uniform may give them the color of the service uniform has again been changed.

On the recommendation of a corps appointed to consider the subject, it has been decided to substitute olive green for the olive drab as the color of khaki intended for army uniforms. The change has induced a great deal of comment in the service and protests have been made against further changes in the uniform, although the change of recommendation does not involve any individual expense to the soldier.

The olive green was devised upon only after full consideration of the subject. It is pointed out that it possesses every quality of invisibility claimed for any color suggested as desirable for uniforms and is especially practicable for service in the tropics, where the khaki is usually of about the color of the ground surface.
