Roller was in fine form, and although Gotch tried every one of his well-known tricks and exerted every bit of his wonderful strength, he could not put the Seattle man on his back. The local friends of Dr. Roller were very enthusiastic last night and showed their hero with congratulations. Dr. Roller says he has quit the wrestling business, and will now attend to his practice. Dr. Roller is well known in Portland through his connection with the Seattle club's football team. He is playing against Multnomah in this city last season and the year before is well remembered by those who witnessed the contests. He is a splendidly built man, standing six feet six inches tall, and weighs about 215 pounds. He is an aggressive footballer and is a student of the game. Off the field he is a most companionable fellow, and one of his chief traits is his extreme modesty.

GAME AND FISH LAWS FOR STATE OF OREGON

For the benefit of Journal readers the following extracts from the Oregon fish and game laws are printed herewith: Open Season for Fish and Game. Upland birds, October 1 to December 1. Killers of more than 10 birds in one day prohibited. Sale prohibited. Prairie chicken and quail in Wasco county from August 1 to October 15. Sale prohibited. Moose, buck deer and mountain sheep, August 15 to November 1. Female deer, September 15 to November 1. Use of dogs prohibited in hunting deer. Sale prohibited. Elk protected until 1907. Open season for trout, April 1 to November 1. Sale prohibited. Black bass not protected. Silver gray squirrel, October 1 to January 1. Hunting license for residents of the state, \$1; for non-residents, \$10.

MONEY APPROPRIATED FOR SCHOOL ADDITION

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Kelso, Or., Oct. 12.—At a special election last Saturday the people of Kelso voted \$8,000 bonds for the erection of an addition to the Washington school-house, which is one small step toward accommodating the greatly increased enrollment of pupils. But one dissenting vote was recorded against the bonds. Plans and specifications are being prepared and the building at the addition will be started at once. Meanwhile the lower floor of the city hall is being fitted up as a school-room, and as soon as another teacher can be found it will be used for the seventh grade. Kelso schools are rapidly developing and the town will soon have a first-class high school with one-year course.
