WHITE SLAVES ARE AWARDED DAMAGES

(Journal Special Service.) Helena, Ark., Oct. 16,—After all-night deliberations a jury this morning awarded Adeline Vitt \$625 and Marian Emmons \$1,000 damages for imprisonment on a plantation by Thomas Mus-

grave.

The women are alleged to have answered advertisements for a companion for Musgrave's invalid wife. Musgrave visited them in St. Louis and described his home as luxurious. The plaintiffs were taken by steamer to a small landing, walked inland and found the "mansion" a log cabin surrounded by huts of negro workmen, and no, white women on the place. The prisoners finally escaped and told frightful tales of their treatment. Each sued for \$56,000.

HADLEY BELIEVES HE CAN OUST OIL TRUST

St. Louis, Oct. 16.—Presentation of evidence in the defense was begun this morning in the season of the hearing of the ouster proceedings of the state against the Waters-Pierce, Republic and Standard Oil companies before Special Commissioner Anthony at the Southern hotel.
