

DEPUTY MARSHAL DRIGGS DIES

Well Known and Popular Officer Passes Away at His Home After Long Illness.

SUFFERER FOR YEARS—CANCER CAUSES DEATH

Was One of Most Popular Men in Willamette Valley and Had Been in Office Since Administration of President Cleveland.

Leroy C. Driggs, chief deputy United States marshal, died at his residence, Montgomery and Twelfth streets, at 6 o'clock this morning.

Driggs had been ill with cancer for more than a year, but it was only about five weeks ago that he relinquished his duties in the marshal's office.

He was a Democrat in his political affiliations, but by his peculiar fitness for the work he was called upon to perform in the duties of chief deputy in the marshal's office under a Republican incumbent.

Police Have Three Theories. Spokane detectives who have been assigned to the case have openly advanced three theories in connection with the murder.

In view of the locality, the time and the broad glare of the electric light when the murder was committed, they are inclined to dismiss the theory of footpads.

Having abandoned those two theories which at first seemed plausible, they were forced, it is said, to attach importance to the remaining one.

So far as was known by his intimate acquaintances, Hutchinson had no personal enemies. He was popular with all classes with whom he came in contact.

Grasping at that the detectives are said to have learned that previous to her marriage to Hutchinson, the young woman was the recipient of constant attention on the part of another.

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BOLD HIGHWAYMAN GETS BOOTY

ROBBER DID NOT USE MASK TO HIDE FACE

Crime One of Boldest Recorded by Local Police Department—Officers Search in Vain for Some Clue to the Thief.

Disregarding their usual caution, the footpads operating in this city have laid aside their masks and in the very glare of the arc lights are operating successfully.

After securing his plunder the footpad warned his victims not to raise an outcry, and still covering them with a revolver of heavy caliber, backed away until he reached Couch street.

The police officer raced to the other side of the lot with the intention of heading off the thug. Finding there was no trace of the fellow, he requested two citizens to watch the Park street side of the lot while he telephoned to headquarters for assistance.

As the police were returning to the station, two citizens, whom Bailey had asked to watch one side of the lot, gave the information that the hunted criminal had run out of the inclosure, gun in hand, and disappeared in the darkness near Burnside street.

Detective Heller, to whom the majority of the recent hold-up cases have been assigned and who has failed to make a single arrest, has been detailed to search for the footpad.

SHIPS RIDE OUT HARD STORM

Gale Terrific Off Coast and the Weather Stations at River's Mouth Are Cut Off.

NO REPORTS COME FROM NORTH HEAD

Bureau Thinks Storm is Spent and Danger is Over—All Vessels Believed to Have Weathered Severe Gale in Safety.

District Forecaster Edward A. Beals has been unable to receive any reports from the coast since yesterday, owing to the wires being down.

The weather bureau gave warning of the approaching storm as early as Monday morning by hoisting the danger flags at the various stations, and as they are usually headed by navigators it is doubtful if any of the coasters were compelled to battle with the enraged elements.

Assistant United States Engineer Gerard Bagnall, who has charge of the ferry wheel at the mouth of the Columbia river, has received no word yet as to whether or not the storm did any damage to the trestle work.

The steam schooner Cascade crossed in over the bar shortly after daybreak this morning. She rode out the storm of the river during the night without damage.

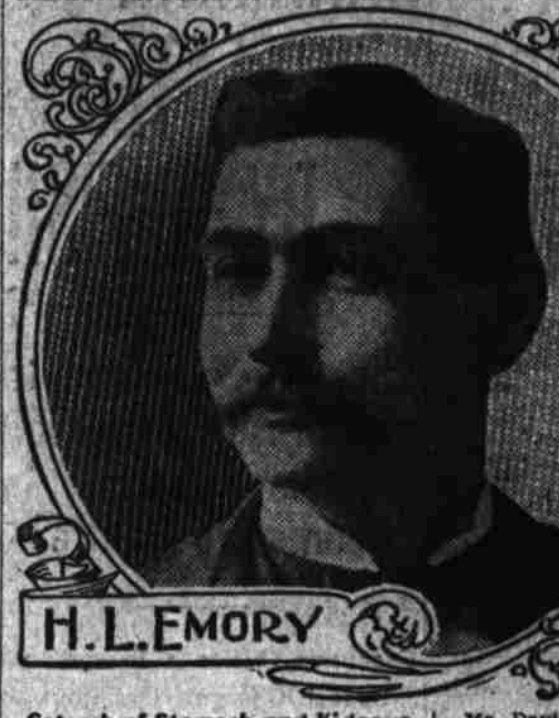
