GRAFT RAMPANT IN SAN FRANCISCO

President of Potrero Merchants' Association Makes Sensational Charges.

FIVE THOUSAND PLACED TO POLICEMAN'S CREDIT

Pinkertons Gathering Evidence of Corruption and Alliance Between Criminals and Police Department Officials.

(Journal Special Service.) San Francisco, Oct. 18.—Lester Jacobs, president of the Potrero Merchants' association, made some strong statements last night concerning the conditions of the city.

"Everybody knows that there is graft and lots of it. Every one knows that the present grand jury is weak, and I am sure that a new grand jury, to be selected by Judge Graham will be no better than the existing grand jury.

"We have not yet conclusive proof that Chief Dinnan received the money, but we expect in a few days to be able to obtain all the proof necessary that some prominent official of the police department is in possession of the coin."

Jacobs openly charged that vast quantities of material are stolen with the full knowledge and consent of police officials.

HOTEL WAITRESS STRIKES IT RICH MINING

Saves Up Her Meager Wages and Grubstake Prospector Who Locates Mine.

(Journal Special Service.) Reno, Nev., Oct. 18.—Having saved money she earned for three years while working as a waitress in Bodie and Goldfield hotels, Miss Samona Guerra grubstaked a prospector, and the mine he discovered at Wonder has just been sold for \$480,000.

Miss Guerra supported the family out of her meager earnings and still she was able to save \$400. Her parents lived at Independence, and she sent coin there every month to help them.

The purpose is to decide upon a basis upon which to arbitrate the differences of the two contending parties to the grainhandlers' strike.

If the conference results in an agreement as to the basis for arbitration it will be a surprise to both parties.

Members of both committees have expressed grave doubts as to the possibility of reaching any amicable understanding. Both are willing to arbitrate the question of wages, but the grainhandlers want it understood that all other conditions will be resumed as they existed before the beginning of the strike, while the exporters are loath to discharge the strikebreakers now at work and to employ only union men as formerly.

(Continued from Page One.) waterfront alone, Mr. Burns pointed out today, would involve the entire list of unions affiliated by the Building Trades Council, as such unions would refuse to handle cement, lumber or other building material unloaded from the ships by imported strikebreakers.

HOLD CONFERENCE

Secretary Fitzgerald of the Federated Trades Council estimates the number of union members at present working in Portland as 7,000.

MEMBERS OF CONFERENCE

The hour of the joint conference was set for 2 o'clock this afternoon. Peter Kerr, C. E. Curry, T. B. Wilcox, J. Couch Flanders and W. J. Burns comprise the committee of exporters, while Oscar Melby, A. C. Lewis and H. E. Blue, executive board of the grainhandlers' union, constitute the committee acting in behalf of the strikers.

The letters of the grainhandlers and the exporters accepting the arbitration plan in general sense were received by Mayor Lane yesterday afternoon.

Prior to 1895, the letter said, Portland grainhandlers received 40 cents an hour. That year, on account of the hard times, the union did not resist a reduction to 30 cents, as the employers promised that when better times came the old wage would be resumed.
