ADMINISTRATION USES NO CHINESE LABOR

Shonta Denies That Coolies Are Employed or Will Be on Panama Canal.

(Special Service.)

Chicago, Oct. 18.—Chinese labor is not being employed in the Panama canal zone, nor will it be, according to Theodore Shonta, president of the Panama canal commission. Mr. Shonta arrived in Chicago today to visit his parents, Dr. and Mrs. H. D. Shonta, and to attend the celebration of his mother's

eighty-third birthday today at Beverly Hills. He said the sanitary conditions in Panama were excellent and work on the canal showed steady progress.

"I cannot imagine how the report started," he said, "that Chinese were being employed as laborers on the canal. I have never hired Chinese and never contracted for Chinese labor, but simply invited bids. There are no Chinese employed in Panama to my knowledge."

OAKLAND STRIVES TO END CARNIVAL OF CRIME

Drastic Measures Taken by Board of Police Commissioners in California Town.

(Special Service.)

Oakland, Oct. 18.—Drastic measures were taken by the board of police commissioners to put an end to the reign of crime which is terrorizing the community, and as soon as arrangements can be completed for a proper guard, every able-bodied prisoner in the Oakland city prison will be put to work in

the chain gang, breaking rock for repaving the streets. In a resolution adopted by the police commission the chief of police was instructed to form a chain gang and put all vagrants and persons convicted of petty crimes to work.

The commission also adopted a resolution ordering that the supplies of food and bedding for the city prison be reduced to a minimum, that the prisoners may learn that the jail is not intended as a place of entertainment or leisure. Several eastern detectives have been secured to assist in ending the reign of crime in this city.
