SENATOR FULTON TALKS HARBOR. Says He Will Bend His Energies to Securing Favorable Legislation for the Coast.

THINKS DELEGATION MAY BE OF BENEFIT. With Western Representations Banded Together Much Can Be Accomplished in Behalf of Rivers and Harbors, He Thinks.

THINKS DELEGATION MAY BE OF BENEFIT. United States Senator Charles W. Fulton in discussing his plans for the coming session of congress said this morning that he would bend all his energies to securing favorable legislation for the improvement of the rivers and harbors of Oregon.
