

MILLIONAIRE PURCHASED WIFE OF ANOTHER MAN FOR \$200

New York, Oct. 24.—Witnesses gave remarkable evidence recently in the suit for \$75,000 for alienation of his wife's affections brought by Edwin H. Tucker, a prominent, young insurance broker, against Eugene B. Dudley, who is 40 years old, 5 feet 4 inches tall, and a wealthy manufacturer. The trial began yesterday in the supreme court in Brooklyn.

The agreement by which Tucker, for a sum of \$200 paid to him by Dudley, released all claims on his wife's affections and absolved Dudley from all liability will play an important part in the case.

It was testified that Tucker and his wife met Dudley shortly after their marriage, seven years ago, and that the three became such fast friends that Dudley was asked to live in the Tucker home. He was called "papa" by Mrs. Tucker, and Dudley and the young and pretty wife went on trips together,

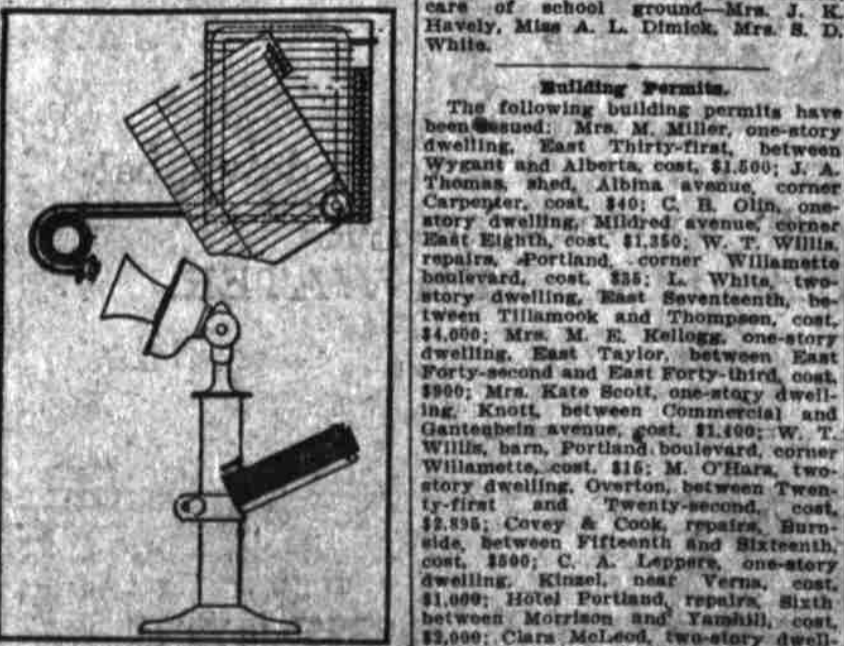

MOSQUITOES KILL PETS
They Are Deadly Enemies of Canaries and Pigeons.

That scores of canaries, pigeons and other birds in captivity in this city are the victims of the merciless attacks of mosquitoes during the summer months is the opinion of many bird fanciers and those in a position to know. It is testified by these owners of feathered pets that great numbers of birds become weakened and die from the effects of having the life blood sucked from their bodies by the insects at night.

"It would be difficult to estimate the number of feathered pets which each year die in this city from the nightly attacks of mosquitoes," said James A. Graham, a canary fancier.

"I noticed several years ago that the legs of my pets were swollen and the skin cracked and sore. Some of the birds had died from some cause that puzzled not only me, but some of the best-posted men in the city. All kinds of remedies were tried, but the birds continued to shrink and drop from their perches dead. It was suggested to me finally that mosquitoes might have been the cause. I at once set to work to remedy the trouble. The cages were covered with a net each night to keep the pets out, and as an extra precaution the legs of the birds were dipped in penicillin, red cedar and other oils that are known to be objectionable to the mosquito. The effect was really magical. In less than a week the birds began to sing, were active and began to show signs of renewed health. My cages are now covered and will remain so until the last mosquito has taken its departure."

Mr. Graham was asked if he thought the insects could bite through the feathers of the canary.

"With perfect ease," was the answer. "It is a well-known fact that all birds when asleep during the hot weather open their feathers to allow the free circulation of the air. This makes it easy for the long-billed mosquito to get

"I have known whole lots of fine birds to become puny and to actually drop from their roosts without being able to assign any reasonable cause for the trouble. The suggestion of the responsibility of the winged insect as the cause is a perfectly rational answer to the puzzle. I have no doubt in the world that the attacks of the insects are responsible for the deaths of scores of pet birds in this city each year. Young pigeons are, I have no doubt, very susceptible to the poisonous bites."

Preserving Wood With Sugar.
The latest method of preserving wood is to treat it with a solution of sugar. The material to be treated is put into a cage and the latter plunged into a boiler, which is then closed, and a solution of beet sugar introduced. The liquid penetrates the pores of the wood, and as would appear from the results of microscopical examinations, under goes some sort of union with the fibrous substance, so no traces of sugar crystals are found after the process is completed. The wood is then withdrawn from the boiler and dried in an oven, which is regulated to different degrees of temperature, depending upon the nature of the material submitted to treatment. It is claimed that wood thus treated is no longer porous, can be
