Were Independence League Candidate to Withdraw, Democrat Would Be Elected.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC BACK OF REPUBLICAN NOMINEE

Railroad Agents Forced Gillett on Party and Are Openly Supporting Him—Bell and Landon Making Aggressive Fight.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) San Francisco, Oct. 27.—At the day of election approaches the campaign in this state is becoming warmer and the three candidates for gubernatorial honors promise to make a whirlwind finish the like of which never has been seen in California.

The fight ever since the nominating conventions were held has been an extremely bitter one, each accusing the other of being the puppet of a corporation or the complaisant representative of a man with an ax to grind.

Theodore A. Bell the Democratic nominee points to James N. Gillett as the Southern Pacific's main and the enemy of labor. Gillett declares that William H. Landon, the Independence League nominee, is nothing more than the mousetrap of W. R. Hearst, and Landon denounces both Bell and Gillett as being Southern Pacific men, bought and paid for.

Railroad Backs Gillett.

There can be no doubt of Gillett's support. It comes from the Southern Pacific and the Espee people make no bones about it. The railroad's agents gagged and bound the Santa Cruz convention and jammed Gillett down the throats of the delegates willy-nilly. The brazen manner in which this was accomplished has caused quite a defection from the ranks and a number of influential Republicans have announced their intention of doing all they can to encompass Gillett's defeat. Union labor has taken up the cause and is doing it unsparringly on Gillett. From one end of the state to the other the word is being passed that Gillett is labor's enemy, and his record in congress, where he voted against an eight-hour day on the Panama canal, has held up as proof. Despite the handicaps which his railroad connection and attitude toward labor constitutes, Gillett is making a vigorous fight and his managers are certain of his election.

Bell's Aggressive Fight.

Bell, who has a habit of sweeping away natural Republican majorities when seeking office in his home county, refuses to admit that he is up against a former boss. He is conducting his campaign on the issue of the independence of the state, and is preaching the Democratic doctrine merely for the sake of preaching, but with the firm conviction that he has better than a fighting chance. With union labor behind him, he feels that the Republicans are not so firmly entrenched as they affect to believe they are, and there are many who are confident enough to predict that if Landon were out of the race, Bell would be the next governor of California.

Landon Not in It.

Landon's campaign is generally looked upon as an ill-advised one. He has not one chance in a hundred of winning, he is standing on an avowed platform of independence, honesty, fair play and anti-bossism, he cannot hope to even run second in the race. The great body of voters are divided between the two old parties and the issue between Gillett and Bell has been plainly drawn and that issue is, "Shall the Southern Pacific dominate the state?"

Reform Vote Split.

Langdon was pushed into the arena by Hearst, who, failing in his effort to secure control of the Democratic organization, decided to disrupt the party. In a sense, therefore, Langdon is nothing more than a "spite" candidate. It is true that he is hurting Bell's chances, but he is also drawing some of his support from the Republican ranks. Hearst had hoped that his reputation as the friend of labor would bring the workingman's vote to any man he might place in the office of his independence League ticket, but the workingman is smart enough to realize that he has little chance of defeating Gillett with Landon in a three-cornered fight. Therefore, seeing in Bell his only hope, he has called upon Landon to withdraw and has even appealed to Hearst to order Landon out of the race, but both Landon and Hearst refuse to quit. Summing up the situation, it looks like Gillett and the Southern Pacific will get the majority of the votes cast, with Bell second and Landon last, but a different story might be told if Landon were out of the contest.

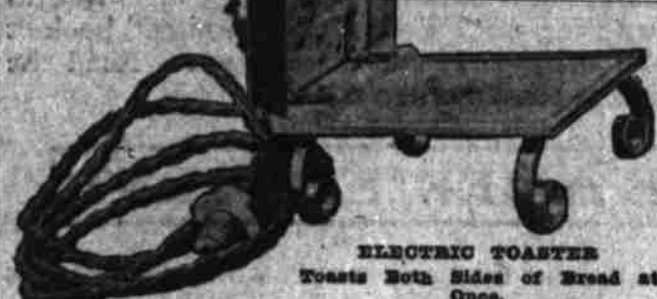

Heavy Penalties Provided in Forgotten Civil Service Act for Offenses That Are Practiced Daily by Politicians.

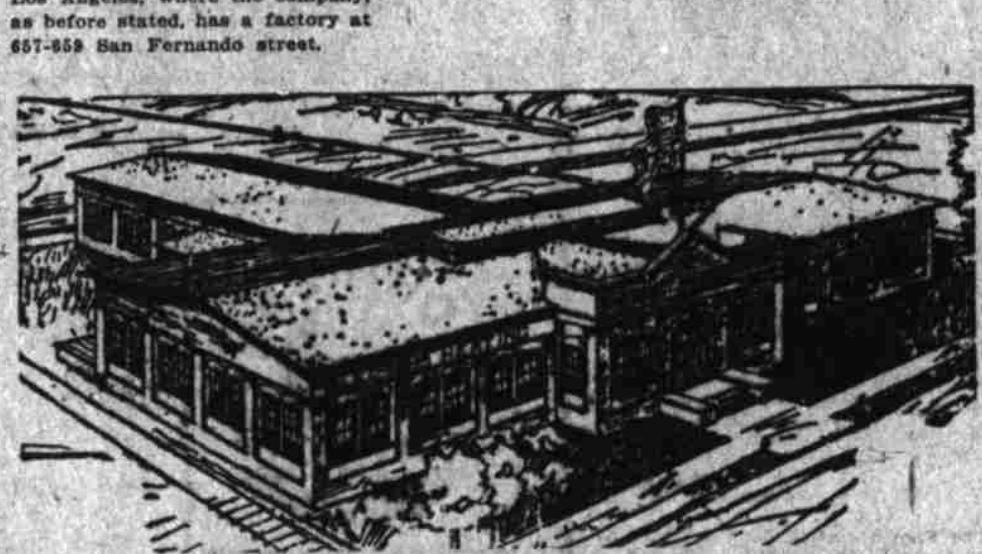

## EPISCOPALIANS TO FIGHT MRS. EDDY

Church Authority Sanctions Oil Anointment to Oppose Christian Science Teachings.

(Journal Special Service.) Milwaukee, Oct. 26.—The Living Church, the official organ of the Episcopal church in America, has in its current issue formally declared in favor of war on Christian Science, by the use of similar methods of healing, the anointing with oil.

This it is believed, will be an effective remedy in many cases for the loss of support which the Episcopal church has sustained in common with other denominations whose members have been won away by the creed of Mrs. Eddy.

The Living Church says that the ancient unction ceremony has never been formally discontinued or abolished and that any rector is at liberty to take up the practice at once.

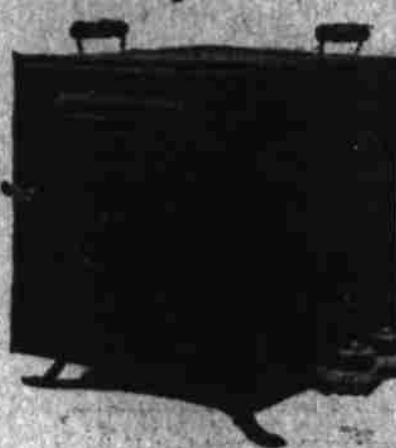
