THUGS CAUGHT IN ACT OF ROBBING AGED MAN

OLDEST HUMAN SKULL FOUND IN NEBRASKA

Serious Trouble Expected at Walker Lake, Nevada—Already Locating Claims.

INDIAN AGENT ACCUSED OF FRAUDULENT WORK

Enormous Charge of Giant Powder to Be Exploded as Signal for Rush to Begin—Thousands of Gold Seekers Waiting.

(Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Hawthorne, Nev., Oct. 27.—From every present indication there will be serious trouble at this little village before the Walker Lake Indian reservation is opened next Monday noon. There is much ill-feeling against Robert Lovagrove, the Indian agent, for the way he has been conducting affairs. Being reported that he and Senator Nixon and George Wingfield, the latter the principal owner of the rich Mohawk mine in Goldfield, and Nixon's partner, are trying to use Indians for locating claims before the opening day.

The opening of the reservation will be announced by an enormous charge of giant powder, exploded on top of Mount Grant, 11,000 feet high, near this town. Every day brings hundreds of gold-seekers and they scatter along the boundaries. There is a camp of 500 on the slope of Mount Grant; 1,000 are at Yerington, 50 miles to the west; 500 are scattered about Hawthorne in tents, and about 300 are at Wabuska. Many will rush in by water across the lake.
