Judge Cleland will have to decide how much material was used in the construction of the building.

At a joint meeting of Pacific coast horticultural interests to be held at Hanford, California, December 6-7, E. L. Smith of Hood River will make an address on behalf of the fruitgrowers of Oregon. It is expected that a number of Portland and Oregon fruit men will attend. A special car will leave Portland for Hanford Saturday, December 1. The delegates will stop overnight at Astoria to see Luther F. Burbank and visit Mrs. Yrooman's walnut grove.

According to a report filed in the county court by Administrator W. O. Hawkins the heirs of the estate of Colonel L. R. Hawkins will receive \$85,724. The report shows that the total receipts of the administrator were \$75,465, while the disbursements amounted to \$21,535. All that remains to be done before the distribution of the property among the heirs is the payment of the inheritance tax due the state. The estate will be divided equally between Mary K. Hawkins, mother; Daniel R. Hawkins, Theodore P. Hawkins and William J. Hawkins, brothers; and Florence J. Stuart, niece, of the deceased.

Merritt Humphrey, who was confined in the county jail on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of his minor children by neglecting them, was released from jail yesterday afternoon on his own recognizance by Judge Fraser. Humphrey's wife, Lizzie, who was arrested with him on the same charge, was sent to the city jail on her own recognizance.
