COLUMBIA TEAM VICTORIOUS

First Interscholastic Football Contest Is Won by Coach Lonergan's Pupils.

GAME WAS FAST AND EXCITING THROUGHOUT

Columbia Lads Proved Better Players at Critical Times and Earned a Touchdown—Match Was Cleanest Played Game Ever Seen in City.

The well-trained Columbia football eleven defeated the Portland High school team yesterday afternoon in a Multnomah gridiron. The contest was one of the best academic football matches ever witnessed in Portland and the losers need not droop their heads on account of the defeat because they went up against a sturdier, steadier and faster team, and met the inevitable.

The First Half. Grussel kicks off for Columbia; Lewis, High school's right end, receives the kick-off and advances 10 yards. P. H. S. backs right tackle for no gain, then fumbles and recovers the ball. Hastings catches the short place kick and gains 20 yards to Hastings, who advances the ball 15 yards before being tackled.

Labourette Is Busy. Grussel now attempts his first place kick but it falls far behind the line by Labourette, for P. H. S., who advances 35 yards before being downed. High school makes 16 yards by a double pass, but Dabney stepped over the side yard and the ball is taken back.

High School Holds. On the third down High school holds and is penalized 15 yards. P. H. S. now executes a very clever forward pass from Labourette to Lewis and gains 20 yards by the play, but time is called and the first half over. Score, 0 to 0.

quarterback run around High school's left end, Columbia university now tries on side kick. Hastings for Portland High school tries to catch it, but fumbles and the ball rolls over Portland High school's goal line, where Columbia university recovers it.

Misses Another Goal. On the next two downs Columbia university gains but one yard and Grussel tries once more for field goal. Hastings catches the short place kick and advances eight yards. High school attempts forward pass, but it is fumbled and Columbia university gets the ball.

Score 5 to 0 in favor of Columbia university. Smith for Portland High school kicks on the third down who advances 25 yards. Botterfield makes 15 yards around High school's right end. Grussel makes 12 yards on fake punt and time is called.

Atkinson and Holladay Play a Tie. Atkinson and Holladay played a tie game at Holladay Park by a score of 5 to 5. Although Holladay weighed more than Atkinson, Atkinson held Holladay to one touchdown. The star of the game was Duff, who made a quarterback run which resulted in a touchdown for Atkinson.

KNIGHT OF ELLERSLIE DIES AT WOODBURN. (Special Dispatch by Leased Wire to The Journal) Lexington, Ky., Nov. 10.—The noted stallion, Knight of Ellerslie, owned by Luelon O. Appleby of New York, is dead at the Woodburn farm of John H. Morris in Woodford county.
