The Market Basket

A housewife inquires: "What is the reason for the high prices that always rule in the retail markets for chickens no matter how low the price is at wholesale?"

Today you can buy dressed chickens in the retail markets of Portland at prices ranging from 16 to 18 cents a pound, according to quality. Some dealers are forced to charge more money because of the expense attached to delivery and "charge" accounts. This forces these latter dealers to add about 2 cents a pound to the price what others charge. The sale of chickens at all times of the year is within 2 cents a pound of other periods. This 2 cents a pound represents the change in wholesale quotations, values very seldom going down more than that amount and very seldom advancing to a greater sum. Once in a while the chicken market will be very short of supplies, and this forces the retailers to pay an additional premium over the regular market in order to secure sufficient stocks to supply their trade. When this high price is reached it is not charged up to the retail price.

Two weeks from yesterday will be Thanksgiving and already the holiday birds are arriving in the markets. Dealers say they never saw such good quality as is shown by the retail markets at present. The "cull" stock that comes in not seen in the best markets—the trade does not want it. There is every likelihood that the price of dressed turkeys this Thanksgiving will be 25 cents a pound in the retail markets, this being the same figure as ruled a year ago. Already retailers are paying over 30 cents a pound for the best dressed birds in the wholesale markets. There is every prospect that there will be a sufficient amount of birds for all the demand, but

you'd better order early so that your dealer will be able to give you the best quality.

The retail butchers are still crying "Down with the trust" and the people are getting their steaks at somewhat lower prices than formerly. The steaks are better than they were some time ago. Pork is high because live hogs are scarce and values in the wholesale markets are up in the air. The same condition exists as regards mutton, and it takes a good-sized purse to supply your wants in this line. There are no prospects at this time for a reduction in the price of mutton. Sheep are getting higher every day because of the larger demand and smaller supplies. Already contracts have been written for sheep to be delivered next May and the price paid is about as high as now.

There was a scarcity of fish during the past few days and this condition will continue until the weather moderates. The closing of railroad traffic to the sound caused a famine in halibut for all of the local supplies coming from there. The storm has caused the fishermen on the Columbia to desert their nets and in consequence salmon can only be had in the best markets and the price is higher. Dealer claims that practically out of the question as long as the stormy weather continues and crabs have disappeared for the time being.

You can get better apples in the retail markets today than ever. Fruit inspection has caused those growers who produced inferior and infected stock to either cut down their trees or else remedy the evil. Wormy apples are not seen at all in the markets because there is no sale for them. Good apples are cheap enough for anybody. A few retail prices for you:
