PLANT TO GIVE

Assertion Made by Men That He Owns Only Part of State Printing Shop.

BETTER PART OWNED BY OTHERS, THEY SAY

Offer to Present Plant to State Looked Upon by Politicians as First Move in the Fight Against Duniway and His Friends.

Public gratification over the announcement made by Ex-State Printer Frank C. Baker to the effect that it was his intention to make a present to the state of his printing plant at Salem, now being used in the office of the state printer, is being modified and chastened by the assertion made by men familiar with the subject to the effect that Baker owns, in his own right, but a small share of the property. He will therefore be enabled to give only the old and wornout nucleus of the plant unless W. H. Leeds, who succeeded Mr. Baker, and Frank Whitney, present incumbent of the office, declare themselves in on Mr. Baker's philanthropic proposition.

It is maintained by many persons that all the interest Mr. Baker has in the plant at Salem consists of the property he left there when he went out of office in 1898. Twelve years before that, when he first took office, he provided a plant with which to do the printing. This plant was old and in some ways insdequate when his term of office expired.

When Leeds took possession of the office he purchased new materials, new type and other essentials of the office, until at the end of his eight years of service he had accumulated quite a stook of new materials.

When Whitney took charge of the office he made arrangements with Baker and with Leeds for the use of the plant, and since his four years of office he also has added many new things to the plant called for by the increased business and wearing out of the old
