According to the interstate commerce commission, there were employed by the railroads in 1905 a total of 1,286,221 people, and presumably the number is in excess of this today. Of this number, approximately 52,000 were engineers, 55,000 firemen, 18,000 conductors, 106,700 trainmen, 46,000 switchtenders, crossing-tenders and watchmen; 48,700 were engaged in general administration, 415,000 in maintenance of way and structures, and 566,788 in conducting transportation. During that year this army of employes was paid a total of \$817,598,810, and the 10 per cent increase would make the annual wages amount to \$900,000,000. According to the interstate commerce




