The Portland Gas company is being petitioned to extend its mains into the district and supply the gas that the people are waiting for. New grades are being established and several streets are to be improved as soon as the bids are received. East Belmont, from East Thirty-ninth to Francis avenue, Central avenue, Francis avenue, East Taylor and Royal avenues, are all to be improved right away and the people are ready and anxious to furnish funds for the improvement of other streets and regret the delays occasioned by the routing that might be the immediate improvement of all these streets at once.

The residents of Tabor Heights believe, and are ready to back up their belief, that they have a much finer location than the city. They are now advancing by leaps and bounds and several handsome residences are to be erected there in the spring that will be a credit to any location in the city.

Club Holds Meeting.
The East Side club of Portland met last night in the Brown hotel and with Whitney L. Boise presiding, approved the articles of incorporation, adopted bylaws and authorized the directors to lease quarters for use of the organization. The capital stock of the club is \$2,000 and the bylaws are modeled largely after the Commercial club and Arlington club, the membership being divided into regular, absentees, temporary, army and navy and honorary. The charter membership is expected to reach the 200 mark before the charter roll is closed. The members of the board of directors will meet this afternoon to complete the lease of the top floor of the Brown where their quarters will be located.

East Side Women.

The East Twenty-eighth Street Improvement association has started a movement to widen East Glean, between the west line of the Ladd farm and the Sandy road to 89 feet, to conform with the road to be opened through the Ladd farm and to the city limits of Montavilla. The committee that has the thing in consideration will report at the meeting to be held Thursday evening. The street can be widened with little difficulty if done at once, and it will make one of the best streets leading into the country if this improvement is made.

DAY'S EVENTS ON EAST SIDE

Machinery for Sellwood Woolen Mills Installed and Ready for Work.

SELLWOOD REAL ESTATE MAKES LARGE ADVANCES

New Water Main From Upper Mount Tabor Reservoir to Portsmouth Is Completed—East Side Club Holds Meeting—Other East Side Notes.

East Side Department.

The machinery for the Sellwood Woolen mills is now nearly all in place and the big washers, dryers and carders will be set in motion next Monday, when the mills will be put into operation. The power is furnished by water and only the occasional flapping noise made by the belts turning over the large wheels make one aware that there is any power at all impelling the long shafts that turn so smoothly in their bearings, and which reach the full length of the long building. Everything is perfectly adjusted and speaks of long experience on the part of the mechanics and draftsmen who planned and erected the mills.

T. Ross of Las Vegas, New Mexico, is the promoter and proprietor of the mills and has 20 years' experience with woolens. He refuses to talk concerning his plant at Sellwood, but prefers to wait until the mills are working their full capacity, when he can back his statements with actual demonstration. It is his purpose to put on the market an article that so far has not been attempted with Oregon wool, but further than that he refuses to divulge anything at present.

Believes in Oregon.

Mr. Ross has great confidence in the future of Oregon, and especially of Portland. He was a resident of Las Vegas, New Mexico, for ten years, where he had an opportunity to watch the growth of Los Angeles, Seattle and other growing communities, and after faithfully studying the conditions in several such places came to the conclusion that the advantages that Portland possesses in the Willamette valley and the Willamette river are unsurpassed because of the cost. He says that real values in Portland are ridiculously low because Portland people are slow in waking up to their own advantages, and says "at present it is only a matter of getting in on the ground floor."

Mr. Ross has invested several hundreds of thousands of dollars in Portland in the last 18 months in suburban property, as he says, within an incredibly short time the east side will be one solid city from Astoria to Oregon City. Mr. Ross says, "Just get on the car and ride from Oregon City to St. Johns, and you will see them building that city now just as fast as they can get the machinery on the spot."

Activity in Sellwood real estate has followed the construction of these mills and a bunch of eight lots that could have been bought in Ross' addition one week ago for \$150 are now sold this week for \$175. Other property in the vicinity of the mills is increasing in value and people are inquiring for small pieces every day. The O. W. P. will soon establish another station in Sellwood because of the increasing population in that part of the city.

Water Main Completed.

The new water main from the upper Mount Tabor reservoir, 11 miles to Portsmouth, through North Albion, has been completed and yesterday the water was turned into the long pipe. It took several hours to fill the pipe, as the air had to be driven out and the standpipe holds 250,000 gallons of water. To the standpipe in the Vernon tract the main is 24 inches in diameter, and from there to the end it is 16 inches in diameter.

The new pipeline will be tested at once, when connections will be made without delay. This line will cost the city about \$250,000 and will greatly improve the water supply of the entire east side. Mount Tabor, Montavilla and Center addition will also receive their water from this line, and these sections expect to reap great benefits from this new improvement. The citizens of Mount Tabor are looking for an increase of activity in building in that territory at once.

There are now many fine residences in the process of construction at Mount Tabor and the foundations for new ones are being laid every day. There is scarcely a day that there is not a real estate record and every record in most cases means a handsome home and spacious grounds, every one of which very materially helps the neighborhood in which they are built.

Membership Is Increasing.
