cunning. The downcast eye has in all ages been typical of modesty. The proper distance between the eyes is the width of one eye. Eyes of melancholy temperament rarely have clear blue eyes. Eyes in rapid and constant motion betoken anxiety, fear or care. Eyes with long, sharp corners indicate great discrimination and penetration. The white of the eye showing beneath the iris is indicative of nobility of character. Gray eyes turning green in anger or excitement are indicative of a choleric temperament. When the upper lid covers half or more of the pupil the indication is of cool deliberation. An eye the upper lid of which passes horizontally across the pupil indicates mental ability. Unsteady eyes, rapidly jerking from side to side, are frequently indicative of an unsettled mind. It is said that the prevailing colors of eyes among patients of lunatic asylums are brown or black.

Eyes of any color with weak brows and long, concave lashes are indicative of a weak constitution. Eyes that are wide apart are said by physiologists to indicate great intelligence and retentive memory. Wide-open, staring eyes in weak constitutions indicate jealousy, bigotry, intolerance and pertinacity without firmness. Table Don'ts. Unfold the napkin to half its breadth and lay across the lap. To let it lie and use it unfolded, or to tuck it in the dress are serious infractions of table etiquette.

Never under any conditions tift a soup or bullion dish. Absent-mindedness is quite as unpardonable in good society as if the act were done deliberately.

Bread should be broken into small bits, each piece being buttered separately. Never lay a slice of bread on the tablecloth to cut it or to butter it. Neither must it be held in the hand as a whole slice to be buttered. Biting into a slice of buttered bread is unpardonable. Learn to handle small pieces daintily with the finger tips.

Raising a dish or saucer in this manner is exceedingly bad form; almost as much of an offense as drinking tea or coffee with the spoon in the cup. Entrees should not be touched with the knife and the same rule applies to salads. It is permissible to use a piece of bread to assist in the action of rolling a leaf of lettuce on the fork.

Leaning on the table with the elbows, sitting far back in the chair, drumming with the fingers, playing with the salt cellar, or tracing designs on the cloth in an abstracted way with knife or fork are mannerisms to be avoided.

To Make the Neck Pretty. To make the throat full and round, the best exercise is to bend the head slowly forward until the chin touches the neck, and then slowly raise the head to its normal position. Repeat these movements until you are tired.

Then bend the head as far backward as possible. Sitting erect in a chair, bend, then roll the head from one side to the other, and then roll the head to the right, left and forward. Another good position is to let the arms hang loosely at the side. Raise the shoulders as high as possible, then forward, down and backward until a circle is formed. Continue this for a time, and then reverse the motion. Do this every day for five or ten minutes.

Linen Hints. When hanging your linen to dry use two lines comparatively close and parallel for your tablecloths and sheets.

Throw one—selvage—side of your tablecloth over one line toward the other, allowing it to hang down about a quarter of a yard and being careful to pin it a short distance from the ends. Take the opposite side of your cloth and throw it over the other line, making the first line, and pin it in the same manner.

This will form a sort of bag and will prevent to a considerable extent the wild blowing of the tablecloth in windy weather.

After table linen is thoroughly dried, remove it from the line and prepare to dampen it. A whisk broom is excellent for this purpose.

Table linen, in order to bring out the bright gloss that makes it attractive, should be dampened quite considerably.

Sprinkle the tablecloths freely, being sure that the selvage ends or hem-stitched borders are thoroughly damp, says Woman's Life. Roll up tightly, patting the roll frequently to spread the dampness.

How to Test Oleomargarine. Take a little piece of glass and rub a little dab of the doubtful article upon it. If it is stimon pure butter, when you hold it to the light the smudge will be a smooth blur. If it is oleomargarine, there will be light and bright specks all through it.

These are crystals of beef fat stearine. The difference between pure lard and an adulterated article can be told in just the same way. Pure lard makes a smooth blur, while the imitation, which has a large percentage of stearine compressed from beef fat, shows the same stearine crystals.
