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ORIGINS' SUGAR A NOTCH LOWER

Star Brand Goes on the Market at the Same Price as the Best Product.

SAID TO BE JUST THE SAME QUALITY AS CANE

New Value Places Beet and Cane on the Same Basis, an Occurrence Most Unusual—Price of Regular Brands Still Above August Price.

Principal market features today: Another season's crop of sugar. Large yield is not firm. High market is just holding. Big advance in fresh sugar. Hop market holds well. Car shortage getting worse. Potato market is better.

Another Stand in Sugar. Just where they stand is a mystery to the grocery chain of the city at this time. Further declines are shown in the price, and the low level of prices cannot be so far off.

What Sugar Sold at Formerly. While the sugar market is low at this time, the established brand of the refinery can better a year two ago when beetles began between the California and Hawaiian and the Western Sugar Refining company.

California and Hawaiian Lower. This put the present list price for that brand. The same day the California and Hawaiian went the market advanced at 4.85, a loss of 10c from present price.

Big Advance in Fresh Salmon. On account of the heavy advance today, Wholesale fish men say they have never seen such small supplies of salmon.

Hope Are Holding Steady. Transactions in the hop market are increasing slowly and the market is within the range quoted by the Journal.

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California & Hawaiian Refinery Places Its Star Brand of Cane Sugar at the Same Price as the Beet Product—Market Complicated.

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CONVICT ROBBETT OF LAND FRAUDS

Jury Returns Verdict of Guilty of Subornation of Perjury on One Count.

DECLARED NOT GUILTY UPON SECOND COUNT

Jury Being Impaired Today to Try William Dwyer Upon Similar Charges—Is Indicted Upon Two Counts.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lewiston, Idaho, Nov. 21.—The jury in the case against Clarence W. Robbett after being out 31 hours, returned a verdict last night finding defendant guilty of subornation of perjury on the first count and not guilty on the second count.

The first count charges him with suborning George Ray Robinson to swear falsely in making up a timber claim, in swearing that he had been upon the land when he filed his application, when he had not. The second count, upon which he was not indicted, charged him with suborning Bernal H. Farris of the same offense.

Today a jury is being impaneled to try William Dwyer, for subornation of perjury. Dwyer is indicted upon two counts, and the case is similar to that of Robbett. Dwyer was engaged in locating men on timber land and it
