

OREGON'S VICTORY DECISIVE

Varsity Men Do Splendid Work Against the Clever Team From Washington.

WEARY CHANDLER IS BRIGHT, PARTICULAR STAR

Something of the Spirit That Aroused Eugene's Gladiators to Renewed Effort When the Purple and Gold Scored the First Touchdown.

By John A. Horan. Eugene, Or., Nov. 21.—The Oregon varsity demonstrated its superiority over the University of Washington yesterday by defeating Coach Place's eleven 16 to 6, and also proved its claim to the northwest collegiate championship.

Oregon has a great collection of football players—not so great as a team as the score would indicate, but great as quick-witted men, whose hearts and souls are in the game and who can take advantage of every error made by the opponents, and who can still "make good" for themselves at the same time.

Yesterday's game was the first big contest that I have been privileged to witness from the grandstand in a long time, and as I watched the local rooters file in the grounds with a sort of victorious step, and the stand fill up with the beautiful young women of Eugene—friends, students, and graduates of Oregon—it at once came to a full realization of why the Oregon boys are so successful on the football field, as well as in other athletic sports.

It was a great Oregon victory and the hero was the rugged man and star player, known to everybody as "Weary" Chandler, Oregon's captain and clever right end. His work was a revelation. He followed the ball like a hawk and didn't leave his opponent even a grunt.

Oregon entered the game with three of her best men on the sidelines—Fleg, Moulton and Latourrette. The outlook was not so bright, but the men who succeeded the crippled warriors proved themselves fighters and made good, with plenty to spare.

Clark, formerly of the Portland academy, punned like a Broke, and backed up the line in successful fashion. Kuykendall at quarter was a host, played a gilt-edge game and covered himself with glory in running through a broken field for 40 yards and a touchdown.

McKinney and Hammond, Moores and Arnsperger also played superior ball. Boggs, Bagshaw, Teightmeier and Parker did the best work for Washington.

The field was nothing but mud—too much mud for good football. Of course, the rain attended in quantities, making the ball a most treacherous oval. The players resembled 22 mud men after the first few scrimmages. Considering the mud—and it was genuine mud—the fumbling was not frequent.

In the game Gordon Moores lost his stockings. W. Lair Thompson was umpire, and he was recognized by his old gray sweater. Bruce Shorfa, beloved at Eugene, looked like a volunteer fireman in his "licker."

"Father" MacArthur did a Dr. Zanz dance when Oregon scored. Coach "Beeswax" tried to look like the "Great Stone Face," but made a failure of the attempt. Dr. Ziegler looked like a human chrysanthemum alongside of big Martin Pratt of Multnomah fame, who stopped off at Eugene to look after some business interests.

Hon. Samuel Friendly was so excited that he drove home in the wrong carriage. Manager Slattery of Washington didn't succumb until after the curtain was rung down. There were so many other features that it would require columns to tell all.

Oregon Has Merit. Oregon deserved yesterday's victory. Her men played fast, snappy ball, took advantage of Washington's errors and

outpented the visitors. While Oregon's teamwork was not up to the standard hoped for by Captain Chandler, yet the Oregon men were all over the field after every play made it possible for them to recover a majority of the rumbles. At times Washington displayed a formidable offense, but just when it looked as if they were going to keep on the forward march the men took a slump and the fine prospects were cast aside.

The long trip of the Washington men had a bad effect on their playing, and it was certain that the visitors had the same training facilities and the same conditions attending, the result would have been somewhat different.

Coach Place of Washington, a lovely fellow from Dartmouth college, is to be congratulated on the splendid showing his new material made. With a comparatively new team he whipped together an eleven that is a credit to any university.

In the meantime the Multnomah clubmen had better look to their laurels on Thanksgiving afternoon. The Oregon team has every reason for thinking that this is its year to beat the clubmen, and in this surmise they are quite correct.
