INSANE SWEDS TRIES TO KILL HIMSELF

Ontario, Or., Nov. 23.—Henry Anderson, 22 years of age, a native of Sweden, while passing through the county attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself three times in the neck and attempting to sever the arteries of the wrist with a jack knife near the railroad track south of town. He was

found about noon by A. T. McLaughlin and John Carter near a strawstack on William Morfill's ranch, where he had crawled after his attempt. Dr. Prinsling, who attended to Anderson's injuries, stated that while Anderson lost considerable blood, he will recover. Anderson claims to have been a teamster at Chicago and says that he went to Yellowstone park last spring, where he worked on a railroad. He later came to Nampa, Idaho. At the latter place he broke his leg and had been in the hospital there until about a week ago. His mind is unbalanced and he will be sent to the asylum at Salem.
