

NO SENTENCE AT THIS TERM

Remarkable Incident Arises in Land Fraud Cases at Moscow, Idaho.

STATE ASKS COURT TO DEFER TO NEXT MAY

Attorney for Convicted Men, on the Contrary, Urge Instant Pronouncement and Take Exception to Denial—State Has Use for Culprits.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal) Moscow, Ida., Nov. 27.—Sentences have not been passed on Robnett and Dwyer, convicted of defrauding in public land cases.

District Attorney Rutk asked that sentence be deferred because the defendants were resting under other indictments and the pronouncing of sentence now might disqualify them as witnesses in their own behalf or other cases where the government might want to use them. The cases against Robnett and Dwyer were of much less importance than the conspiracy cases against others, and their evidence might be needed in the prosecution of them.

Judge Beatty said that one reason he desired to defer sentence is that a case similar to this is on appeal to the circuit court of appeals and will probably be decided before the next term of this court. If it should be so held that these cases would be entitled to dismissal, then these defendants would escape sentence altogether. He took the case under advisement and held defendants under their existing bond.

Judge Forney took an exception to this ruling. The grand jury returned two indictments. One is said to involve three men in Kootenai county, who are wealthy and prominent in business circles.

Thanksgiving Thoughts.

How to simplify our housekeeping on festive occasions is a timely subject, and the following article is sure to be read with interest by many a good house mother who may in her secret heart feel a little burdened with the extra work entailed by our national feast days.

The Thanksgiving Dinner. By Mrs. Joseph H. Jones. The American housewife is far too apt to think that stuffing her guests to the verge of repulsion is the most patriotic way of honoring our national festival. She imagines that because her grandmother overloaded her table on this occasion, she must do likewise, even though her own preference might be for a little originality in the matter of the Thanksgiving feast, as well as any other.

We all know that the dish which comes in the shape of a pleasant surprise is the best appetizer, and since no traditional law governs our choice of viands on this holiday, if we except the turkey, and perhaps the pumpkin pie, there might be many pleasant surprises.

One would be wholly lacking in respect for his forefathers were he to suggest a digression in the "piece-de-resistance," but we may, with no offense, introduce some modern dishes and depart from set lines to the extent of ignoring others of our grandmothers' day.

We might, for instance, set aside the substantial oyster soup, with its accompaniment of wafers, and in its place substitute a chilled fruit salad that would whet the appetite instead of appeasing it.

The chicken pie, too, is quite sufficient of itself to form a dinner, and, as a rule, the guests who have partaken heartily of the turkey have no appreciation or appetite left for a second meat course. Some crisp, cool salad, such as a Waldorf, might take its place with decided improvement.

By careful planning ahead, very little of the work in preparing the suggestive menu given below, for a family dinner, need be left for Thanksgiving day.

On Wednesday the turkey can be prepared, the paste for the pies made, the pumpkin cooked and sifted. The vegetables may be gotten ready, the little cakes baked and the cranberry jelly made and molded. In preparing the turkey for roasting, lay it breast down in

the roasting pan, after brushing it well with melted butter. This insures a fine, juicy tenderness for the breast, which is the best portion of the fowl. The success of any dinner depends largely upon how it is served. If there is a maid, she should be plainly and thoroughly instructed beforehand that there may be no awkward delays. There is wide choice in the matter of the table decoration for this occasion, but good taste will usually dictate a simple centerpiece of fruit or flowers. If the former be preferred, then only the fruit which is home grown should be used to best typify "the day we celebrate."

Pomegranate ice is made by adding two cupfuls of the strained juice of blood oranges, four tablespoonsful of lemon juice and the grated rind of two oranges to a syrup made from two cups of sugar and a quart of water. Cool before mixing and after straining, freeze quite hard and serve in cocktail glasses.

Winter Millinery.

From Dress. Hats, like gowns, have been modified by time, and there is less eccentricity to be noticed than a month ago in all millinery. Many of the shapes are odd, but almost without exception they are becoming and are graceful in line. The soft felt and velvet hats with velvet and ostrich feathers are charming and the colors most attractive. The length of the ostrich plume threatens to be a caricature if it continues, but for the moment the long plume around the crown and falling down to the collar at the back is odd and graceful. Small hats are not so exaggeratedly tiny and have more evidence of being chosen for the individual shape. Velvet and cloth with stiff wings, bows and flowers are the correct combination for this style of hat in contrast to the plumes and feathers worn on the more elaborate and picturesque shapes.

Table Decorations.

During this busy week the housewife is much occupied with plans for the Thanksgiving feast and the setting of the table and serving of the meal form an important part of the program. A suggestion as to table decoration is given by the Philadelphia Inquirer which is not difficult. Two large horseshoe tables are placed at the head of the ends of the table filled with fruits in season; attached to these are ribbon streamers that depend from the centerpiece proper. In the center of the table stands an electrolite with six or more yellow bulbs, surrounded by large fluffy chrysanthemums. The candle shades are of yellow silk with beaded fringe. If the dinner is served early there remains an interval which must be made cheerful and entertaining for the children of the family as well as the guests. On this day of all days we want to cement the bonds of good fellowship, and a game that is possible for all ages is desirable. The old game of rhymes may be acceptable. Let each person draw a slip of paper on which is written a word and a question. Each must write a Mother Goose rhyme answering on bringing in the question and using the word. The results are sometimes very funny and a clever person will produce results that are convulsing. Remember that sense is not necessary. Here is a sample of this sort of literary effort.
