WOULD WATCH ALL
CAMPAIGN FUNDSPortland Republican Club Has
Proposed Bill to Insure
Clean Elections.MAY BE PRESENTED
TO THE LEGISLATUREWould Force All Candidates to Make
Itemized Report of All Money Expended
During Race for Office to
State Commission.

Future office-seekers in Oregon will have to submit their list of campaign expenses to a commission empowered by the law to regulate all election expenses and campaign expenses if the legislative committee of the Portland Republican club has its plans enacted into law.

The legislative committee of the club composed of State Senator R. C. Beach, Representative John B. Coffey, A. J. Capron, W. P. Keady and Charles F. Lockwood is at work on several proposed measures for submission to the coming session of the legislature. The draft of a bill which will be entitled a corrupt practice act has been made by the committee. This bill in general will provide that all candidates for office coming before the people for election must keep a true account of their expenses, which account must be at all times open to the inspection of a commission also provided for in the act. The purpose of the bill is to secure freedom in the future from all forms of corruption in elections.

A bill is also being drafted providing for the use of voting machines in state, county and city elections at the option of the different parts of the state. It will be provided in the bill that a commission be appointed to consist of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, the duty of the commission being to investigate the practicability of different kinds of voting machines, and from the list to select one kind for the use of the state. It is then made optional with the cities and counties whether they use the machines or not.

SOLONS TO MEET
WEDNESDAYMultnomah County Legislators
to Hold Preliminary
Discussion.SERIES OF MEETINGS
HAVE BEEN PLANNEDImpending Legislation to Be Discussed and Plans Formulated for
the Work of the Delegation When
the Legislature Convenes.

Multnomah legislators are beginning to cram like school boys for an expected examination, and in furtherance of their search for knowledge a meeting has been called for tomorrow evening at the office of Frank F. Freeman in the Panton building, at which time matters of legislative interest will be discussed.

It is expected that this will be the first of a series of meetings to be held by the members of the house of representatives for this county. At these gatherings planned to fill in between the present and the time for the meeting of the legislature all bills which have been drafted, and all legislation which is proposed will be discussed in order that the Multnomah delegation at least will have a fair understanding of the questions which will have to be settled during the session.

The present meeting has nothing to do with the question of the speakership, so the members of the delegation say, but it is admitted by them that before the series has ended and the course of study has been conquered, the speakership question may be brought up and discussed in all its bearings. It will doubtless be the case that legislation will have some material bearing upon the attitude of Multnomah county on the speakership question. It is safe to presume that Multnomah's support will go in the direction which will lead to a beneficial return of legislative favors. This same condition will also prevail in the other counties, so that the delegation of this county will, perhaps, be called upon to decide its candidate with legislation as a basis for support.

It is possible that the members of the senate may meet with the representatives before the legislature convenes in order that all matters of legislation affecting the county may be discussed by the full delegation and some harmonious course of action agreed upon. The call for the meeting tomorrow was issued by Representative Willard H. Chapin, Multnomah's candidate for speaker, who is expected to preside at the discussion.

The intent of the bill is to furnish added facilities for elections, particularly in the larger districts of the state, where the counting of the election returns entails long and hard work by the judges and clerks. It is expected by the authors of the bill that should it become a law it would be especially convenient in Multnomah county at this time.

General measures affecting the election laws and the conduct of elections are under discussion by the committee which will perfect several measures before the opening of the legislature and present them to the session through members of the Multnomah delegation.
