

HARRIMAN SYSTEM TO BE PROBED

Interstate Commerce Commission Orders Investigation of Traffic Lines.

PARALLEL LINES OWNED BY HOLDING COMPANY

Sherman Anti-Trust Law, Interstate Commerce Law and Statute Against Conspiracy Said to Have Been Violated by Harriman.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Washington, Dec. 7.—An investigation of the Union Pacific railroad and of the relations between that road and the Southern Pacific system, growing out of their common management and control has been ordered by the Interstate commerce commission. Frank R. Kellogg and C. A. Severance of St. Paul have been retained by the commission to conduct the investigation.

The most serious is that a condition similar to that which prevailed in the Northern Securities case exists, the Oregon Short Line company being a holding company.

Backed by Standard Oil.

Backed by Standard Oil money, Mr. Harriman has gathered under one common control more than 25,000 miles of railroads, representing an capitalization of \$2,000,000,000.

The interstate commerce commission is convinced that Harriman, in the Union Pacific, has not only violated the Sherman anti-trust law, but also the interstate commerce law and the statute against conspiracy. The Oregon Short Line Railroad company has been using the holding company as a mere cloak to hide their violation of the law in suppressing all competition between the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific, which are parallel lines.

Plenty of Evidence.

There is plenty of evidence to prove that Harriman and his associates have succeeded in stifling all competition between those two roads. J. C. Stubbs, at a salary of \$50,000 a year, is director of traffic in control of the two lines and dictates rates and distributes traffic. When the Union Pacific recently increased its individual rate to 10 per cent a year, a proceeding which even Wall street denounced as an unpardonable stock-jobbing transaction, was officially stated at the headquarters of the Union Pacific that the increase was in part warranted by the large revenue derived by the Union Pacific from the holding of Southern Pacific stock.

Arrangements have been made for beginning the hearings later in the month, the exact date not having been selected. Chairman Knapp estimates that it will take at least 30 days to complete the investigation.

GREAT RUSH TO WINDY HOLLOW

Jonathan Bourne and Amalgamated Bidders for Original Discovery.

COWBOY DISCOVERERS PAN THEMSELVES RICH

Offer of Hundred Thousand for Prospect Hole Declined—Claims Staked in Darkness, So Great the Rush—Plans for Developing District.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Grants Pass, Ore., Dec. 7.—M. Marks, who with several Seattle and southern Oregon associates, is opening up a rich property in the recently discovered Windy Hollow mining district, near Lakeview, has come in from the new camp and states that a boom, almost equal to that of the famous Nevada bonanzas is on at Windy Hollow. Two cowboys, James and John Loftus, discovered a glory-hole by accident. They took out a few hundred dollars worth and have uncovered a wide ledge glittering with gold. They have been offered \$100,000 cash for their property by Jonathan Bourne, also by the Amalgamated Copper company, but have refused the offers, preferring to work the property themselves.

This strike has caused the first rush to Windy Hollow, and it has been on the ground since December 5. Claims were staked in the darkness, and many disputes and no little gun play followed, giving the new Eldorado a genuine border-time atmosphere.

The Loftus discovery is called the Jumbo, and will be fully developed.

Around the original strike claims were staked in all directions, no part of the whole Coyote Hill range being overlooked. Mr. Marks and his people were among the first to get into the new district, and believe they have acquired a good group of claims. The corporation organized to develop and operate them is known as the Lakeview Mining & Milling company. Mr. Marks, who is manager of the company, has already let a contract for driving a long tunnel through the mountain, and shops and mess houses are being erected, and the camp shaped for permanent operation.

The principal proposition of this company, like that of nearly all the claims of the new district, is that of a huge dyke, carrying its values in a quartzite and phenolite composition. These values are regularly and constantly distributed through the entire content of the dyke, which has a width of more than 100 feet. The outcrop of the dyke appears on a steep hillside, offering splendid chance for economical development and operation, as all ore can be removed by tunnel. The values of the dyke are principally free gold, with some silver and copper.

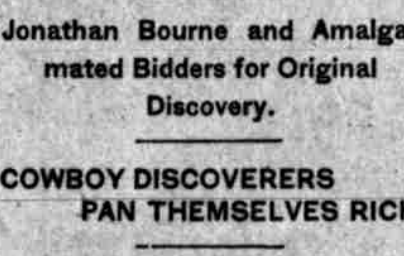

THIS IS THE MEANEST THIEF IN PORTLAND

Steals Salvation Army Collection Box From Store Where It Had Been Placed.

There are thieves of high and low degree in Portland, clever thieves and those who are crude, but the meanest and pettiest of the whole bunch is the one who stole the Salvation Army collection box from Store where it had been placed.

The theft occurred Wednesday night, and since that time detectives have searched in vain for a clue that might lead to the arrest of the miscreant. The box contained between \$3 and \$4 in small change. It was situated on a desk in the front part of the store, near the telephone.

Many persons request the use of the telephone during the day and even a larger number call during the night, for the store is open at all hours. It was late Wednesday night that the theft of the box was discovered and the loss was at once reported to police headquarters.

The Salvation Army keeps similar boxes in various stores and public places where the charitably inclined may contribute their pennies or other small change to help the poor. Officers of the army declare that the theft of one of the boxes is extremely rare.

BRITAIN'S OPINIONS OF MESSAGE

Nebraskan Finds Both Praise and Blame in Roosevelt's Latest Effusion.

MORE DEMOCRATIC IDEAS STOLEN BY PRESIDENT

Censure for Placing War as First Consideration of Country—Legislation for Japs Should Not Interfere With State's Rights.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 7.—Commenting on President Roosevelt's message, William Jennings Bryan in today's issue of the Commoner says:

"The message contains much that is Democratic and for which the general public may well thank him. It contains some things that ought to arouse severe criticism. The president boldly appropriates some doctrines which the Democrats have been advocating, but on the other hand, he announces doctrines which are so absurd as to excite amusement. If the suggestions came from a less prominent man, or from a statesman who takes advanced ground, in some cases he retreats from ground already taken."

Warlike Attitude.

Finally, Mr. Bryan deplores what he calls the president's warlike attitude. He says in conclusion:

"There will be general disappointment at the warlike tone of his message which he discourses to the army and navy. He speaks of the navy as the surest guarantor of peace, which this country possesses. Shame upon the chief executive that he should place an instrument of brute force above the nation's sense of justice as a guarantor of peace. The best guarantor of peace is our nation's purpose to deal justly with other nations. War that to be a last resort, not a first consideration. It is bad enough to have a few professional soldiers. It is not necessary that the whole nation shall be kept up all the time to the fighting point."

Stands for State Rights.

Mr. Bryan complains that what the president says on the subject of government by injunction will not be satisfactory to the laboring man or to those who respect the right of trial by jury. The president's stand on child labor is commended, as is also the position he takes on the eight-hour law and the right of the people to criticize a judge. Referring to Mr. Bryan's reference to the Japanese question, Mr. Bryan says:

"He pays a deserved tribute to the progress of the Japanese nation and to the progress of legislation which will enable congress to protect treaty rights for foreigners. That there should be such legislation cannot be generally disputed, but the great deal depends upon the character of the legislation. If any bills are presented in regard to this suggestion, they must be carefully scrutinized to be sure that they do not deny to the various states the right to protect themselves and their people in matters purely local."
