NOVEMBER LEADS IN EXPORTS

Portland Sent Great Quantities of Domestic Products to Foreign Countries.

COLLECTOR OF CUSTOMS ISSUES MONTHLY REPORT

Statement Shows That 49 Vessels Entered the Harbor During the Month and That During the Same Time 52 Vessels Cleared.

Portland has reached the top notch in value of domestic exports last month by sending away to foreign countries products that will enrich the city and surrounding country to the amount of \$538,786. This is the biggest month's business during the fiscal year, exceeding the record of last month by nearly \$100,000. Since the first of the fiscal year the value of domestic exports for each month have been as follows: July, \$271,360; August, \$500,154; September, \$577,757; October, \$750,265; November, \$538,786.

A summary of the transactions at the custom house for the month of November was issued today by Collector Patterson, as follows: Vessels entered port, 49; vessels cleared for foreign ports, 17; vessels entered for domestic ports, 45; vessels cleared for domestic ports, 35; entries of merchandise free of duty, 198; entries of merchandise free of duty, 22; entries for warehouse, 8; entries for warehouse and exportation, 4; entries from warehouse for consumption, 31; entries from warehouse for exportation, 1; entries for immediate transportation without appraisal, 47; total number of entries of merchandise, 322; certificates of enrollment granted, 10; licenses for coasting trade granted, 10; licenses to vessels under 50 tons granted, 3; total number of documents to vessels issued, 20.

Receipts From All Sources. Duties on imports, \$63,522.96. Islands, .70. Fines, penalties and forfeitures, 16.75. Miscellaneous customs receipts, 604.25. Storage, labor and cartage, 36.85. Official fees, 65.90. Total, \$64,145.91. Wheat, flour and lumber constituted the chief articles of exports.

WILL REMAIN HERE

Man Who Brought Steamer Wynorio Here a Noted Tenor.

J. Lloyd Gibson, who came here as chief engineer of the British steamer Wynorio during the latter part of October, has located in Portland and given up the sea. Mr. Gibson is a noted tenor and has already associated himself with the choir of the Holy Trinity church although he has been busy since arriving here getting established. Mr. Gibson comes from a decidedly musical family, being the eldest son of Annie Lloyd, the famous Welsh prima donna. He became imbued with the spirit of the sea when a young boy and sailed on the Atlantic for some time before coming across the continent. Then he ran as chief engineer on the trans-Atlantic steamers out of Victoria for several years. He took the steamer Wynorio around to Portland because of one of her engineers having fallen ill at Victoria and one visit here was enough to convince him that Portland would be his future home. He immediately sent for his wife and child and secured a cozy home at 712 Albina avenue.

Mr. Gibson was tenor soloist of the St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, at Victoria, and member of the well-known Victoria Arion club. He has already been approached with flattering offers from one of the leading churches.

OLD WINDJAMMER HERE

Mark Diamond Head Was Built in London Forty Years Ago.

The British bark Iverna was to have reached the harbor this morning, but she will not be here until tomorrow morning and then it will be in company with the American bark Diamond Head. This lovely vessel was built in London, England, in 1866, and returned after to drop the Iverna and return to Astoria for the Diamond Head and bring the two up the balance of the way. The Diamond Head comes under charter to the Portland Lumber company to load lumber for a California port. She is one of the oldest windjammers afloat anywhere in the world, having been built in London, England, in 1866, 40 years ago. She first touched the seas under the name of the Gainsborough, but was transferred to the Hawaiian flag and rechristened the Diamond Head many years ago when her business kept her far away from her old English home port trading between the islands in the Pacific. The annexation of the islands to the United States by last year under the state stripes and she is now a money maker, hauling lumber.

Nome Lawyer Says Portland Should Establish Steamship Line.

He assures those to whom he has spoken upon the subject that a steamship line from Portland will have the support of the Nome merchants. "Alaska offers a great field for commerce," said Mr. Jeffreys, "because it is a vast territory and reached chiefly by water. It has a shore line greater than the circumference of the earth and an area as large as California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon and Washington. The greatest need today at Nome is a line of steamers from some other port than Seattle and the merchants look to Portland."
