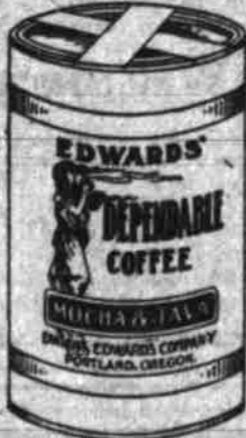

deal was closed today whereby the Hammond Lumber company and the Astoria Columbia railroad purchased 200 acres of the Kindred tract, adjoining the Fort Stevens reservation, at the price of \$60,000. In this connection it is announced that the Hammond Lumber company contemplates building a large sawmill on the property this summer and work will commence at an early date. Lately quite a number of pieces of water frontage has been bonded and a party of Portlanders attempted to bond a mile of water frontage east of Young's bay for \$100,000.

The deal closed by the Hammond interests gives them a frontage of one and a half miles in length extending beyond the railroad track. This, it is said, will be used for lumber yards when the mill is completed. The plans are for a mill that will take 1,000 men to operate.

The Market Basket

Had the matter not been so serious, it would be quite laughable how swiftly some manufacturers of so-called pure foods sidestep when it comes to living up to the provisions of the new national pure foods law and yet keep the public from suspecting that their so-called pure foods have been adulterated right along.

As has been stated on numerous occasions the new law specially states that no product used in interstate commerce or trade shall bear a label that does not properly state its true contents. Thus we find manufacturers of pure maple sugar relabeling their product with the provision that the so-called pure maple sugar likewise is a mixture of same sugar.

Even in salt, the article that the general public thought was always too cheap to adulterate, is not always what it claims to be. In fact, it's nine chances to one that you would not buy pure salt even were it offered you by your grocer. If you did it would not be more than one time, for the morning after buying it your language would be something like this, but only a trifle stronger: "What's the matter with this salt, anyway? It won't come out of the shaker at all. There must be something wrong with it."

The fact is, however, there is nothing radically wrong with the salt—it's too pure, that's the only trouble. Pure salt masses together and will not pour from a shaker. This is the reason why manufacturers use an adulterant. Just the proper adulterant and how much of it to use is the question that bothers the manufacturer most. It's the reason, too, why some brands of salt sell at higher values than others. As a general thing salt manufacturers adulterate their product with a sort of starch. This acts as a dryer and allows the salt to pour from the shaker without interfering with your temper.

If you buy some of the ordinary jelly sold in the markets you will now run across a label that reads something like this: "Strawberry mixture. Containing one quarter of apple peel, one quarter glucose, one quarter pumpkin and one quarter strawberry flavor." A label which shows the apple butter you always thought was manufactured out of nothing but pure apples, would in many instances read: "Apple mixture. Manufactured of pumpkin, squash, artificial

coloring and a small percentage of apple." Condensed cream will hereafter be put under the label where it properly belongs and will be known as condensed milk, for it is not cream at all. Manufacturers who formerly labeled their goods as the genuine Mexican article will not be allowed to do so now. Practically all the canned Mexican foods are either made in California or Texas, and they must bear the label of that state and contain the word "Style" after the name Mexican.

Handlers of fish do not know why there has been such a great scarcity of fish of late. There is at this time but little fresh salmon in the market, mostly cold storage stock being used. Some small amounts of fresh halibut are in market but the high price is keeping down the demand to small limits. A few days ago there was every promise of a heavy run of Columbia river smelt, but the run disappeared about as quick as it appeared. This resulted in the price going to 15 cents a pound in the retail markets.

Unless there is a radical change in the present situation all sorts of fresh meats will be very high in the near future—war or no war. Never before in the history of the local packing industry have supplies of all kinds been so small as at this time. So few hogs are coming to market that practically all sold here in the near future will be of eastern growth. Hams and bacon will be no high-priced within a short time that unless the situation changes materially the general public will have to out them off the bill of fare.

Eggs are going up again owing to the cold snap. During the past week the price advanced to such a figure that they cannot be sold under 40 and 45 cents a dozen by the retail trade. Creamery butter supplies are likewise so scarce that there is a real danger of the price breaking a few more records. Poultry is so scarce in the local markets that without the eastern dressed stock now coming it would be too scarce to quote. Best stuff is selling as high as 25 cents a pound in the retail markets.
