

# HARRIMAN GREATEST OF AMERICAN SOCIALISTS

Upton Sinclair, Author of the Jungle, Declares Railroad Magnate is Paving Way for the Rule of People, as Are Roosevelt and Carnegie.

(Publishers' Press by Special Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 12.—Upton Sinclair, author of "The Jungle," and one of the most up-to-date socialists in America today, declared that E. H. Harriman was one of the most leading socialists in the country; that President Roosevelt was next and that Andrew Carnegie, by reason of his recent views on the distribution of money, has greatly aided the cause. Mr. Sinclair is living near Englewood, New Jersey, where he started a colony. He has gathered 45 associates under one roof and says his common home is a great success. "The great library and steel king has written himself down as a great socialist," said Mr. Sinclair, "but not the greatest. Mr. Harriman is the greatest and then comes President Roosevelt." "Harriman comes first," continued

Sinclair, smiling, "because he is concentrating everything. That is what the socialists want, because he is the big fish in the present brutal, ruthless competition. First in the sea the big fish gobble the little ones. Harriman is gobbling them all. In this great country the American people will not stand it much longer. The mass of the people will ultimately gobble Harriman, and then the people will come into their own. "And Roosevelt, the president," said Sinclair, "realizes that it is to do or die. He knows that if he does not Bryan will. The president is therefore determined to curb the syndicates. That is the socialists' idea. "Mr. Carnegie expresses the belief that a millionaire ought to share his wealth with the poor. Isn't that the purest socialism?"

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## TERRORISTS FIGHT WITH POLICE

Four Officers and Ten Soldiers Killed in Attempting to Make Arrests.

## PLOT TO KILL WITTE ENDS IN BLOODY BATTLE

Veritable Panic Prevails Among Russian Bureaucrats—None Know Who Will Next Be Marked for Assassination—Many on List.

## HERETOFORE IT HAS NOT BEEN THE CUSTOM OF THE SUSPECTS TO RESIST THE POLICE OPENLY WITH ARMS.

In view of the bloody battle of today the terrorists are encouraged and declare that the police must prepare to kill and be killed whenever a raid is made.

Today's tragic occurrence was the result of a plot to kill Count Witte. In some manner the former premier was informed that two men had been designated to kill him and secured pictures of the "executioners." When he saw the originals in the pictures hovering about his house he notified the police. The men were placed under surveillance.

It is understood that it was on the suggestion of Witte himself that they were not immediately arrested, but were followed in the hope that the police would be led to the headquarters of the plotters. They were followed to their homes in Okhta quarter and a force of policemen were thrown about the house to prevent the escape of any of the inmates.

## Opened Murderous Fire.

Accounts differ as to what happened when an attempt was made to force an entrance to the house. One report has it that there were many men in the place and that they drove the police away, disappearing before reinforcements could be secured. The most generally accepted story is that there were but four of the terrorists present. When the police battered in the door the terrorists who were well armed opened a murderous fire on the police who were bunched about the door. Men fell rapidly and the police gave way. As they did so the terrorists made a desperate dash under cover of a smashing fusillade of bullets which literally cut a path for them through the police lines. Before the bewildered police recovered themselves sufficiently to use their weapons with any degree of accuracy the men had disappeared.

Search of their quarters, it is said, not only revealed a well-formed plot to kill Count Witte, but a list of other noted men were found, all of whom were doomed to death. Papers were also found, it is understood, which will lead to the arrest of a number of active terrorists.

## Four Killed, Three Injured.

When the firing had ceased it was found that four officers had been killed, three others seriously if not fatally wounded, while several others received slight wounds. Hardly one of the party about the door passed unscathed through the storm of bullets. One of the revolvers left by the terrorists was found to be of the latest automatic pattern and a far superior weapon to the Russian service revolver. It was loaded with explosive bullets, and the wounds of the soldiers indicated that the same kind of bullets were used in the fight.

This battle, coming upon the heels of the assassination of General Pavloff and Colonel Andrieff, has caused a veritable panic in official Russia. No official from the czar down feels safe. The assassinations of minor officials in the provinces has assumed appalling proportions and despite the efforts of the officials to prevent news of these constant killings reaching the public, enough is learned to indicate that the whole empire is covered by the operations of the terrorists.

The panic has reached such proportions that peremptory orders, revised by the czar himself, have been issued that no mercy is to be shown suspected terrorists. They are to be executed first and tried afterward.

## MONEY ATTACKING PEOPLE'S PROTEST MARRIAGE HEARD IN BOMBS

Sociologist Asserts That Rich Are Destroying the Ideals of Nature.

## SOCIAL EXTREMISTS CLASSED AS ANARCHISTS

John Graham Brooks Lectures Before League for Political Education Upon the Use and Abuse of Money and What It Buys.

(Publishers' Press by Special Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 12.—John Graham Brooks, sociologist and author, lectured before the League for Political Education in the Hudson theatre today on "Marriage and Money."

Mr. Brooks told of a visit to a great scientist of meeting the scientist's companion, to whom he was not wedded in the eyes of the law, but who, the lecturer said, "had the most pitiable face I ever saw in my life." "But in the social organization it has been found necessary to put constraint upon the family and those are the legal wedges that the law puts about the family to protect and maintain the child."

He said: "That is the answer I would give to those extremists, who are really anarchists. Then the speaker took up the subject of money, declaring that it was the 'greatest mystery' in the world. "Yes, indeed, money is a mystery," he said. "You go out with your money to a hotel, to a restaurant, think of the power that it gives you."

"The press can be bought. You may not believe it, but it is true. There are publicity bureaus. I know one of them whose head showed me a list of papers to whose columns you can get admission on any subject you desire, if you have enough of the symbols, and the worst of it is that you can buy the religious press for those terrible medicines—taking the life—and peace from thousands, defrauding them and propagating death and disease."

"You can buy a child—it has been done—and you can buy a beautiful woman outright. Ten, two of them, if you have enough of those symbols. I know of families trying to get entrance to the great families of Europe. For money and social caste go together. It is possible to buy a duke (laughter). I believe, with an ancestral castle, and, too, a right smart lord, I understand, can be had for a price."

"And so I come to my message. This money that will purchase almost anything has attacked marriage, and it is destroying the ideal that nature wants in marriage—that of selected affinities."

## PEOPLE'S PROTEST HEARD IN BOMBS

Terrorists Declare That Assassinations in Russia Must Go Until Victory Comes.

## CZAR IS MARKED FOR DEATH BY COUNTRYMEN

All Parties Applaud Murders Which Are Intended to Stop Lawlessness of the Autocracy Which Has Created a Reign of Terror.

(Publishers' Press by Special Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 12.—"Assassinations must go on. No one desires a change in the nature of the work more than the terrorists themselves, but the change is impossible until the czar is ready for serious concessions, if not absolute surrender."

This statement was made today by N. V. Tchaykovsky, a member of the central committee of the social revolutionary party, in discussing the murders of General Pavloff and the chief of police of Lodz. This gentleman has just returned from Russia. "Is the czar, too, doomed?" he was asked.

"Yes, and he is in deadly fear. He knows not when the blow will fall or where. It may be one of his own courtiers, some one in whom he has confidence and whom he trusts. He is walled in."

"All parties in Russia applaud the assassinations. They are not a series of isolated attempts to secure liberty by assassinations, but to arrest and stop the lawlessness of the autocratic power."

"The field courts, for which Pavloff and the Russian premier were responsible, have filled the country not only with sadness and dismay, but with a stupor. The awakening has been seen in the assassinations. The wrath of the entire country has been poured out on the responsible officials."

"In four months these courts destroyed the lives of more than 800 people, and day by day the people have been compelled to see the trickling of the blood with no means of stopping the slaughter."

"No one was under any illusion about the nature of the field courts, so-called, in derision of the term. They never pretended to administer justice, but merely murdered quickly the enemies of autocracy."
