President Earling spoke reservedly and with rejuctance, saying he did not wish to discuss the difficulties encountered by the Great Northern and North-ern Pacific or the charge made against these roads by the manufacturers that they had utterly falled to give the serv-ice to the public required by their char-ters and the laws.
