EIGHT HOURS TO BE A DAY ON STATE CONTRACTS

Text of Law Concerning Hours on Government Work Followed in Bailey Bill.

A day's work on state contracts of all sorts will be eight hours if the bill introduced in the senate by Senator Bailey of Multnomah becomes a law. The bill contains practically the same provisions as to the law now in effect controlling the number of hours work

on government contracts.

Senate bill 52, as it will be known until the legislature has adjourned, provides for emergencies in the performance of state contracts, such as water famine or other classes of work for which there is urgent need. When an emergency exists, laborers may work as many hours as there are in the day if they choose, but for all work over eight hours they are to be credited with time and a half.

The measure was introduced at the

request of the State Federation of La-bor. Similar bills have been introduced at previous sessions of the legislature, but all have failed to pass. The pro-visions of the bill apply only to state contracts, since the eight-hours law as applied to private contracts has been held unconstitutional.

Bills providing for a charter for a bridge across the Willamette at IIIk Rock, near Oswego, have been introduced in both houses of the legislature. The bridge is to be built by the Portland, Oregon, and Sea Coast Railroad company, which is being promoted by William Reid.

The bridge is to be open to all railroad, street railway or other transportation companies, which will be subject to tolls by the owners of the bridge. In case of any controversy between any road and the owners of the bridge over

road and the owners of the bridge over the amount of tolls that may be justly exacted, the interstate commerce com-

mission is made the arbiter.

There is to be a free track for the passage of wagons and other vehicles and pedestrians. The privilege of purchasing the bridge at any time it is desired is reserved to Multnomah county. at a price not specified. Should there be any controversy over the purchase price, or over any other matter pertaining to the bridge, it is to be arbitrated by the interstate commerce commission.

Elle Rock is recognized by all railroad engineers as the only practical
site for a bridge across the Willamette site for a bridge across the Willamette a short distance above Portland, and it is considered a strategic point in ratiroad building. This is the place the Southern Pacific has contemplated building a bridge for its west side trains should the Fourth street line be abandoned, and is also desired by the Pacific Railway & Navigation company, which is new building a line to Tilla-

mook, for a crossing.

The bill for the charter for the bridge was introduced in the senate by Senator Nottingham of Muitnomah county and Polk and Lincoln.

Senator Nottingham said this morning that the bill had been sent to him with the request that it be introduced. He had read it twice, he said, and could discern no joker in it, but if it should contain a joker it will be discovered in the committee to which it is referred.
