

**TILLMAN AND CARMACK HAVE TIFF IN SENATE**

Doors of Upper House Closed When Personal Encounter Seems Likely.

Washington, Jan. 22.—The doors of the senate were closed yesterday afternoon on motion of Teller to prevent publicity of an apprehended personal encounter between Carmack and Tillman. Carmack charged that Tillman had ridiculed him without provocation. Advertising in Tillman's reference to Carmack's defeat for reelection, Carmack said: "A fact so obvious is easily within the grasping intellect of the senator from South Carolina, who need not raise his belly from the dust to grasp it." The men were standing close to each other and were getting excited when the doors closed. Tillman's speech was the most spectacular in recent years. It was a reply to the recent criticism of himself by Spooner and Carmack. Spooner replied coolly and Carmack heatedly. Tillman sarcastically compared the senate with a minstrel show. Afterward Tillman apologized to Carmack and other senators that he had mentioned Carmack occupied the apology and regretted his remarks. The Brownsville chair was the subject of the debate and Tillman defended his attitude. Tillman declared that though he had justified lynching for rape, he had deprecated and denounced burning at the stake for this crime.

**HENCEFORTH BUY FROM PEDDLER RIPE IN YEARS**

Old men who have to make their living by the sweat of their brow will hereafter have the exclusive right to peddle horseradish and hominy in Portland. Healthy young men have in the past peddled both the radish and the savory product of the corn around town, and they have taken about all the business away from their elders. They made considerable money out of the business, as they also carried fruit, vegetables and popcorn in their hawkers' wagons. The old men complained to the license department, and Collectors McEachern and Hutchinson recommended to the council license committee that they be placed in a class by themselves and taxed \$3 a quarter. They will have the right to sell horse radish and hominy only. A license of \$12 a quarter was placed upon the young hawkers. Both recommendations were adopted by the committee.

**ONE BURNED INDIAN WAS NOTED RENEGADE**

Once Escaped Through Window From Moving Train—Nex Perces Much Excited.

Lawiston, Ida., Jan. 22.—Tume Pak-Ligit and Yea-Pus-Nute were the two Nex Perces who were burned to death in the Umatilla reservation jail Sunday. The English name of the former is Nicodemus Stevens and he was considered one of the worst renegades on the reservation. Three years ago, when taken to McCall's island to serve a term for introducing whiskey on the Nez Perce reservation, he jumped through a window of a train moving 25 miles an hour and escaped. He had since been living among the Flatheads in Montana until he went to the Umatilla reservation a month ago. The Indians here are much wrought up over the burning and contend that under a recent ruling of the federal courts no agent has the right to order confinement in a reservation jail. Educated Indians hold that since they received their allotments they must be classed as citizens. In the case of the cremated Nex Perces it is said some action may be taken on the part of the friends and relatives of the dead men toward asking for a thorough inquiry.

**SUNDAY MEASURES AND LOCAL OPTION IN IDAHO**

Boise, Ida., Jan. 22.—Local option is before the legislature of Idaho. A bill to provide for elections by counties, precincts and municipalities has been introduced in the house and referred to the judiciary committee. A hearing has already been given lasting three hours. Among the many speakers only one spoke against the bill. There is great hope among the temperance people that an effective law may be enacted. The Anti-Saloon league, the International Reform bureau and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union are cooperating in behalf of the measure. The reform bureau, through the personal supervision of Dr. G. L. Tufts, its field secretary for the Pacific coast section, will have a Sunday rest bill introduced. Mr. Tufts addressed about 100 members of the labor unions at Boise and found a sympathetic response to the principle of a Sunday rest day. At present the state has no such law. Callon Again for Senate. (Special Special Service.) Springfield, Ill., Jan. 22.—Separate sessions of the houses of the legislature were held today. Callon was re-elected to the United States senate.

**TENANTS FORCED TO MOVE STOCKS**

Furniture Company to Occupy Half Block at Second and Yamhill Streets.

Tenants of the five-story building, northeast corner of Second and Yamhill streets, have been forced to vacate by March 1 in order that the firm of Gevurtz & Sons may occupy the entire half block. The James A. Clendenen drugstore, on the corner proper, has a lease running more than two years yet, and so need not move unless its lease is bought. The five-story building is a three-story structure occupying a quarter of a block, with a frontage of 100 feet on both Second and Yamhill streets. It is owned by the Strowbridge estate, which also owns the building now occupied by Gevurtz & Sons, adjoining at First and Yamhill. The firm will proceed to overhaul the new quarters and put in glass-plate front. Elevator service will also be provided, and a total cost for a \$25,000 purchase is expected. The tenants of the building who have now to seek other quarters are the Old Book Store Company, the Portland Gum & Nicotine Company, Hodgson's Music House and Dr. G. H. Strowbridge, whose quarters there are unusually roomy and elaborate. Several lodges will also be obliged to seek other meeting places. These are three tribes of Red Men, the Swedish Society, Societa Cristofor Columbus and others. On the Second-street side those to go are Tamm & Noble and the agency of the Willott Springs mine.
