

NEW KIDNAP EVIDENCE

Conductor Identifies One of Suspects Held for Sellwood Robbery.

MAN MADE LAST TRIP WITH HIM GOING OUT

Streetcar Man Positive Police Have the Right Man—Another Conductor Identifies Second Suspect Who Rode to the Oaks.

Another link in the chain of evidence the police are securing against the gang of criminals arrested in a raid on a lodging house at Front and Clay streets a week ago, tending to connect some of them with the robbery of the Sellwood postoffice and the shooting of Patrolman Sorenson, was secured this morning.

L. L. Morgan, a conductor on the Sellwood line of the O. W. P. company, positively identified Charles Anderson, one of the suspects, as having been a passenger on his car on the last trip on January 17, the night before the Sellwood crime.

This, coupled with the statement of a hotel proprietor at Sellwood that Anderson sought board and lodging at his place a week ago Thursday, makes the circumstantial evidence against the prisoner very strong.
