

# CRACK ATHLETES ARE FEARED

England's A. A. A. Postpones Consideration of Our Application to Join.

BRITISHERS DENY THAT SUCH IS THE CASE

Sporting News of the Kingdom Is Dished Up in Fashion Ready for the Hasty Reader—Moir and Smith Matched to Fight.

London, Feb. 14.—There is a shrewd suspicion that the action of the Amateur Athletic association in postponing action on the application of the American Amateur Athletic union for an alliance with the British association was influenced in some degree by the Olympic games to be held next year.

Of course, no British athlete will admit for publication that the American amateurs are feared, but it would not be going very wide of the mark to say that such fear exists. Before an alliance is arranged, the British Amateur Athletic union and American associations which would let the Americans be the sole judges of the amateur standing of their men, the men on this side of the water wish to be assured that the American union will not tolerate semi-professionalism in any shape. The fact that James E. Sullivan is at the head of the Amateur Athletic union is calculated to inspire confidence, as his stand for pure amateur sports has been seen and appreciated here.

Some idea of the interest the French government takes in the breeding of thoroughbred horses may be gained from the statement that there are 146 thoroughbred stations at 17 government stud farms. They include representatives of all the best strains of racing and hunting blood, not only in England, but the continent as well. The French army alone uses 30,000 horses, a large proportion of which are government bred. In addition to the 360 thoroughbred stations, there are more than 8,000 others at the government stud farms.

The date for the sailing of the Soudanese races for the emperor's cup between American and German yachts has been set for the week beginning August 15 at Kiel. The German yachting authorities, finding that the Americans could not be induced to accept an earlier date, have yielded gracefully.

The fight between "Gunner" Moir and "Tiger" Smith for the heavyweight championship of Great Britain is slated for February 25 at the National Sporting club. There has been a good deal of betting on the result. Moir is the favorite, but Smith is not without admirers, who are willing to back him at the right odds. Palmer, who lost the championship to Moir, has gone to the states.

The illustrated London Sporting News says: "It is stated that Eben M. Byers, the amateur golf champion of the United States, intends to compete in the British amateur championship at Hoylake next May. If that is the case, it is of interest that the Hoylake meeting will be even more interesting than the average amateur championship. Mr. Byers is undoubtedly the most finished golfer that the states has yet produced—a far more finished player than W. J. Travis of New York, who secured our championship at Sandwich in 1904. Mr. Byers competed on that occasion, and created a deal of astonishment by beating C. E. Dick, the Scottish international player in the second round, but he was subsequently defeated after a tie, by Dr. J. Williamson of Richmond. He is not big, but his swing is very long, owing to the extraordinary amount of run that he gets on the ball. But the best feature of his game is his approach, which is uncommonly good.

The announcement that the ladies of the royal family are taking an active interest in golf shows the wide popularity of the ancient Scottish game. Princess Victoria of Schleswig-Holstein played a match recently on the king's private course at Windsor castle—a far more highness and J. H. Taylor, the mid-nury professional, were matched against his royal highness, Prince Albert and P. J. de Paravicini, the well-known cricketer. Princess Victoria and Taylor received six strokes on the 18 holes from their opponents, and won by 3 up and 3 to play.

Georgia Ready for Service.

# ROWING CLUB TO BUILD HOME

Members Hold Enthusiastic Meeting and Decide to Raise the Coin.

WILL ERECT BUILDING ON THE RIVER BANK

New Club House Will Cost Seventy-Five Hundred Dollars and Money Will Be Secured Through Bonds and Sale of Life Memberships.

As published in last Sunday's Journal, the Portland Rowing club members, at a special meeting last night, decided to erect a clubhouse on the bank of the Willamette close to the site where their former house stood before the flood.

Last night's gathering was held in the Commercial club and about 90 members attended. The sentiment of the meeting was enthusiasm and there was an abundance of it, showing that the Portland oarsmen are game to the core, and that nothing like the mere fact of a raging river carrying away their home could dampen their ardor nor quench their efforts to rebuild.

President Ralph Wilbur was home ill with the grippe last night and could not attend, but he sent his best wishes in the substantial form of a subscription when the hat is passed around. W. L. Brewster, president, and the discussion was animated. After thoroughly going over the ways and means of raising money, J. N. Teal moved that a new clubhouse be erected on the bank of the river, and that the handling of the affair be left to the board of directors. This motion carried. The cost of the building was fixed at \$7,500, and the money will be raised by the issuing of bonds and the sale of life memberships.

Dr. A. E. Rockey sent his subscription along in the form of a certificate of \$25, which was duly appreciated.

The directors will get busy now arranging plans for the raising of the money and the building of the clubhouse.

Great interest was felt in English racing circles this year as to the handicaps to be allotted to the Russian Derby winner, Hamurabi, entered in the Kempton Park Jubilee and Great Metropolitan handicaps. The latter is a mile longer than the former and the class is usually not so good. In this race the Russian is given top weight, 122 pounds, but in the Jubilee top weight, 124 pounds, is given to Polymelus, who is conceding to Hamurabi 11 pounds. This practically gives the handicapping committee's opinion that the best Russian form is about 21 pounds below the best English form.

Mrs. Hilliard, who has held the ladies' tennis championship of England several times, has been active in arranging for a team of lady tennis players to go to the United States to compete for the international trophy offered by Mrs. John Jacob Astor. A yet no formal invitation has been received from the American tennis authorities, and until such invitation is received of course no positive announcement is possible, but it can be said with authority that if the proper authorities issue an invitation a team will go to the states in hope of bringing the Astor trophy across the water.

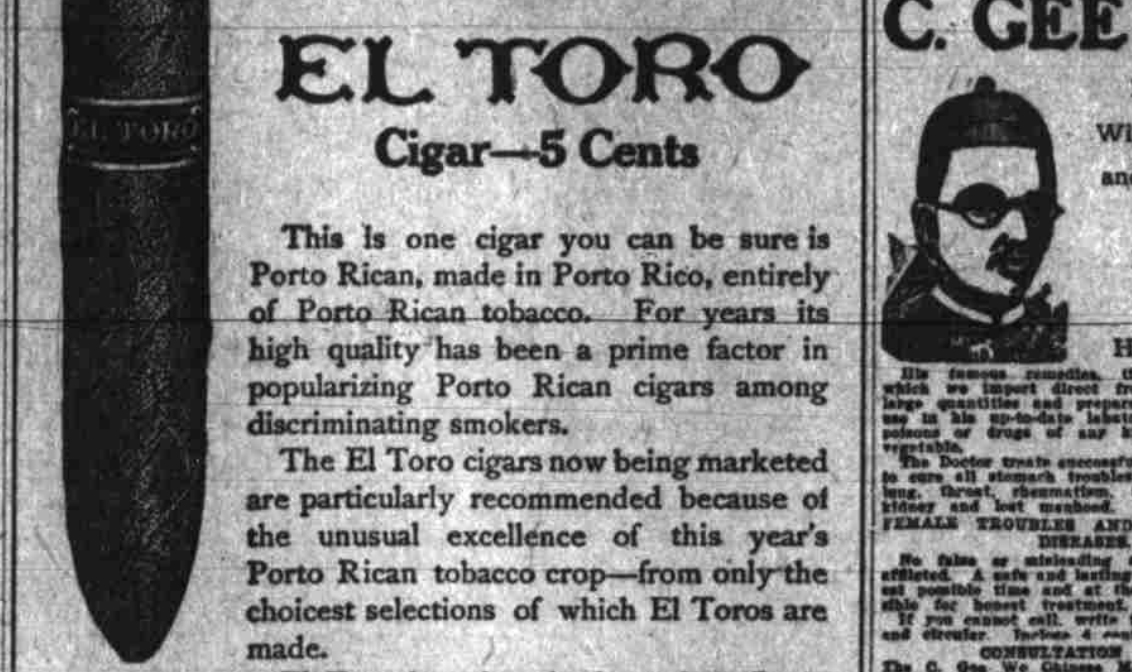
