during the tests. Jerome objected, but the court overruled the objections.

**Howard and Jerome Quarrel.**  
Howard Nesbit, Evelyn's brother, regarded as leading witness for the state, is reported to have quarreled with Jerome, and refused flatly to take the stand to defend the memory of Stanford White in the effort to break down his sister's evidence. Jerome's refusal to promise that Evelyn would not be prosecuted for perjury is rumored to be the cause.

The calm in the Thaw case yesterday was "the calm before the storm." Sentations are mounting up ahead. Counsel adjourned for the day amid a love feast among the counsel held for the purpose of getting together and weeding out certain medical testimony as to insanity in the Thaw family and that sort of thing, which will greatly facilitate the appearance on the stand of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw and the calling of Mrs. William Thaw, mother of the prisoner.

The Thaw will be again on the brink of having secured possession of it to have typewritten copies made. It is to be offered in evidence today. If it gets in, Delmas believes Harry Thaw will have in hand several mighty leads toward freedom.

**Evelyn to Be Examined.**  
With the medical testimony out of the way for the time being, the will disposed of and the cross-examination of Evans and other experts postponed, there will be nothing to prevent the recalling of young Mrs. Delmas up ahead. Counsel of her story, Delmas having now constructed a strong foundation for the insanity plea on which he will go to the jury and which permits of the introduction of much more evidence than the show what drove Harry Thaw mad. Accordingly, unless the legal argument drags out Mrs. Thaw's appearance as a witness is expected Monday and she will remain on the stand until she has completed the long expected cross-examination. First, Mrs. Thaw will relate the things concerning Stanford White's treatment of other girls, which are the subjects of frequent talks between her and her husband.

**More Sensations Expected.**  
She will tell of those incidents hinted at by Delmas on Monday, when Stanford White spoke of her husband disparagingly, by the bedside of Miss McKelvie, when she and Mrs. Caine met White in the theatre and when Thaw told her of hired thugs who were following him, and of his appeal to the Society for the Suppression of Vice to arrest the course of Stanford White.

Many sensational details not yet revealed are said to be on the point of exposure, and Delmas will bring them out to the last letter in an effort to get Thaw free from jail. The last word in his behalf, the younger wife will face Jerome for the most bitter ordeal of her young life. It seems to be generally understood now that Jerome will not be reduced to a witness in the last analysis, the story of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw is the keystone of the arch of the defense. If it is not broken down, Jerome fully realizes that the accused man is free. On the other side the defense realizes equally well that in the manner in which Mrs. Thaw conducts herself under cross-examination they expect to win. Jerome will neglect no means to see that the witness stand is broken, discredited woman, helpless and hopeless. Delmas will neglect no means to safeguard and protect her.

**Jerome Was Now Witness.**  
Mrs. Thaw herself, for the first time, will summon all of her resources to meet the attacks of the prosecution. Before her eyes constantly will be the man to save whose life she ventured everything. In this tremendous struggle of man's wife against woman's love, Jerome will be the arbiter.

Jerome has secured fresh ammunition from Miss Marie Follette, a former friend of Mrs. Thaw, said to have been confident of the young girl, who has placed in the hands of Jerome a long statement, from which he will draw inspiration. Of this statement it is said that it contains remarks made by Evelyn Nesbit to Miss Follette in confidence, which are at variance with the testimony she gave about the affair of the affidavit drawn up by Fumelle. In this statement more is said of this instance of woman's inhumanity to woman. It will perhaps be well to wait and see, Jerome has shown Miss Follette's statement to one of his attorneys. This young man, in a statement from the mother of Evelyn Thaw, which is said to be a mine of information.

**Statement from Evelyn's Mother.**  
It is not known if it contains, among other things, how Evelyn Nesbit, at the age of 12, was permitted by her mother to neglect her education to enter the artist's studio, and how, at the age of 15, having already gone through the life of the studios, the deed was taken by the hand of her mother and consigned to the stage honors, not by reason of talent, but because of the beauty of her face and form. The mother of Evelyn Thaw is against her brother likewise. This young man, a protégé of Stanford White, who accepted money from White at different times, had announced, with the authority of the district attorney, that he would take the witness stand to "vindicate the memory of Stanford White." Delmas hopes he will.

With the mother and brother, former chum, and lawyer, convicted of conspiracy, all arrayed against the young girl, who made such a strong impression on the witness stand, what will be the outcome as regards the fortunes of Harry Thaw? Twelve men are to decide.

**THAW'S HEART WAS CRAZY**  
Not Diseased, but His Nervous System Kept It Running Wild.

(Journal Special Service.)  
New York, Feb. 14.—The course of the testimony of Dr. Evans, the alienist retained by the Thaw defense, Delmas, Thaw's chief of counsel, asked him when the "brain storm" or brain explosion described previously took place.

Jerome objected, because, he said, "the witness had described tests and had not told what the results of these tests were."

The court ruled that Dr. Evans should first tell of results. Evans followed the direction of Delmas and began with saying Thaw's general nutrition was good, the condition of his skin was good and the shape of his head was normal except in one particular.

"What is that?" asked Delmas.  
"An unusual depression at the base of the head, at the back. Just below this depression, I found a similiarly abnormal projection."

"Could you account for that?"

"I could not. I then tested his reflexes," said Evans.

Asked to explain what he meant, witness swung one leg over the other and said Thaw's knee-jerk reflex was exaggerated. He said any unusual sensitiveness in the coordination of mind and muscle indicated nothing in this case. Sometimes it was a test for nerve derangement and for spinal disease.

### STATE FAIR WILL LAST SIX DAYS

Board Decides Against Ten Days' Meet at Request of Livestock Association.

### SEVERAL CHANGES MADE IN CLASSIFICATIONS

Premiums in Horse and Poultry Departments Largely Increased—Special Boxes in Grandstand—Portland Man Gets Bar Privilege.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—The state fair to be held here in September will continue six days. Since the fair of last year the board has been considering the feasibility of holding the show for 10 days but at the request of the North Pacific Coast Livestock association it was finally agreed to hold it for the same length of time as formerly. This is made necessary because many of the members of this association are accustomed to make the northwest circuit with their herds and a longer season at Salem would interfere with their engagements at other fairs.

An innovation that will be made this year is the building of boxes along the front row of the grand stand which will be rented to parties by the week or day. Last year there were many calls for preferred positions among the spectators and it was very difficult for the fair commission to satisfy all in that respect.

Several changes were also made in the revision of the classification of horses and the arrangement of the premium money, which has increased considerably by offers from outside sources. Most of the changes, however, were made in the poultry and horse departments.

The bar privilege has been awarded to W. B. Brown of Portland, whose bid was \$750. The other two bidders were Dannel Sherret of Portland, \$850, and W. E. Wiley, \$550, who had the privilege at the last fair.

The big restaurant privilege was awarded to E. M. Law for \$125. At a previous meeting the pool privilege was granted to W. B. Ayr and the score card privilege to R. J. Hendricks of Salem.

Among those who attended the board meeting was J. D. Gordon of Dundee, one of the new horse breeders of Oregon. He recently arrived from Dakota. He signified his intention of bringing 12 horses to the coming fair. He raises Clydesdales.
