

THEY WILL PASS

New District Made From Wasco and Crook Including Antelope, Shaniko and Madras.

ENEMIES TO FIGHT MEASURE IN SENATE

House Favorable to New County Despite Opposition—Bill Forecasts Future Attempts to Divide Wasco County.

(By a Staff Correspondent.) Salem, Or., Feb. 10.—The bill creating Neamith county out of the southern part of Wasco and the northern portion of Crook, including the towns of Shaniko, terminus of the Columbia Southern railroad, Antelope and Madras, passed the senate this morning. Antelope is named as the county seat.

The passage of the bill has raised a storm of protest from Representative J. P. Belknap of Crook county and others who while favoring a division of Crook county, had not figured on this division. All the forces which the non-divisionists can marshal will be mustered into service to defeat the measure when it comes up for action in the senate.

The lines as drawn by the bill include the ear in the southeastern part of Wasco county and the northern quarter of Crook county, wherein lies a rich wheat belt. Those who have been at Salem favoring divisions of Crook county with county seats at Madras and Bend and an altogether different arrangement of the territory to be included, are completely knocked out by the introduction and passage of the Neamith county bill which was slipped in without much warning.

The move has been made, it is believed, to forestall any future attempt on the part of Hood river to divide Wasco county east and west and create a new county with the county seat at the apple town.

Antelope is situated at the bottom of a deep canyon, surrounded by high plateaus and completely cut off from all the district included in the new county.

Madras is a well known place and has been instrumental in defeating the passage of the measure in the senate.

MRS. WASHINGTON CLEARED OF ASSAULT CHARGE

No Testimony to Prove That She Slashed Mamie Lee, Also Colored.

Mrs. Nellie Washington, colored, who was arrested about three weeks ago on a charge of assaulting Mamie Lee, a white girl, was discharged from custody in the police court this morning on a motion of Deputy District Attorney Haney.

Mrs. Washington was accused of having stabbed Mamie Lee, a waitress in the Vaseline cafe, on Flinders street. The complaint was sworn to by the girl's mother, but the state did not have any testimony tending to connect the defendant with the crime.

Last summer Mamie Lee was slashed across the face by her unknown assailant and may be marked for life from the knife wound.

HINDOOS SHOW HATRED OF BRITISH MASTERS

(Journal Special Service.) Lahore, Feb. 10.—There has been a violent outbreak of anti-British feeling here, following the conviction of the proprietor and editor of the present case of the Punjab, who were accused of stirring up hatred against the government and the English community.

The paper printed a story that an English officer shot a Mohammedan policeman for a trivial reason and that the government arrested the policeman and permitted the murderer to escape.

The government prosecutor showed the policeman was killed by being thrown from his horse.

The court sentenced the proprietor to two years' imprisonment and a fine of 10,000 rupees and the editor to six months' imprisonment and a fine of 200 rupees.

PAGUE GETS FEE AND ALL IS PEACEFUL NOW

In a special session of the police court yesterday afternoon the state attorney advised that William Pague, who was arrested at Oregon City Monday night while trying to elope to California, was dismissed upon motion of Deputy District Attorney Haney, as Mrs. Mildred Wilson, the complainant, did not wish to prosecute.

Attorney B. S. Pague finally received the fee for his services as special prosecutor, over which there had been so much wrangling, and in peace returns supreme. Attorney Simon, counsel for the defense, remained firm in his refusal to "split" with Pague, and the latter lawyer received his compensation from Wilson at the earnest solicitation of the latter's wife.

CRIPPLED PRISONER FINALLY RELEASED

Nick Miller, a cripple, who was a member of the gang of criminals arrested in a raid on a Front street lodging-house several weeks ago, several of whom were subsequently arrested by the federal authorities for the robbery of the Bellwood postoffice, was released from the city prison this morning by order of Judge Cameron. Miller has been in the city since his imprisonment, and his symptoms became so alarming that it was decided to release him at once. If Miller remains in the city he does not conduct himself in a proper manner and will be again taken into custody.
