





Time to Consideration of (aneral Special Service.) New York, Feb. 16.—The directors of the standard Oll company have declared the quarterly dividend of \$15 a share. The dividend was the same around in the corresponding quarter of last year and \$10 per share three months ago. The capital stock of the Standard Oll company is \$100,000,000, of which John D. Rockefeller owns 40 per cent. Of \$10,000,000,000 to be distributed this quarter Rockefeller will receive \$6,000, 000, Since 1898 the company has paid \$320,000,000 in dividends and by the end of the present year the total will reach \$400,000,000, or four times the total capital is nine years. HANGED AFTER TRYING COMMIT SUICIDE

Keep Him Alive for Execution on Scaffold.

(Journal Special Service.) Louisville, Ky., Feb. 16.—Guy Lyons, after attempting to commit suicide in his cell at Russellville by cutting an artery with a spoon which he had se-creted and sharpened on the stone wall, was kept alive yesterday long enough to be carried to the gallows and hanged for murder. He was almost dead from loss of blood the night before when Fletcher, his cell mate, who was hanged with him, informed the prison authori-ties. The physicians kept him alive by transfusing blood from a healthy pris-oner into his veins. He was so weak that four men had to carry him to the sailows and it was thought he would expire before the rope could be put expire before the rope could be put around his neck and the trap sprung.






