

# INITIATIVE HUNDRED IS FOR HIGH LICENSE

Recommends Submission to People of a Bill Preventing Sunday Saloons, Chairs and Women, and Providing for a License Fee of One Thousand Dollars to the City.

A \$1,000 liquor license bill that has stood the test of a fight in the Initiative One Hundred is now on its way to a referendum vote by submission to the people at the next June election. Some amendments adopted by a meeting of the organization last evening will be incorporated in the bill, and it will be brought before the next meeting for final consideration.

Determined opposition to several features of the bill, and to its consideration at all by the Initiative One Hundred, was made at the meeting, and the full force of the influence that could be brought to bear against it is believed to have been counted at last night's meeting. Of the 70 members in good standing, there were 22 in attendance. When the discussion closed, and the question of killing the bill was brought to a vote, there were 10 in favor of throttling it and 11 in favor of the bill. Had the chair voted there would have been 12 for it.

**No Chairs and No Women.**  
After the vote was announced one of the bill's principal opponents on the floor acquiesced cheerfully, and said the result suited him better than his own side had won, as he believed the ordinance was about right.

The salient points of the proposed law are an annual license of \$1,000 from saloons; midnight closing except on Saturday nights, when the saloons shall close at midnight and remain closed until 1 o'clock Monday morning; no chairs in saloons; no women in saloons.

**Two Bankers Object.**  
The law was opposed by J. Frank Watson, who said that if the One Hundred adopted it he would resign from the organization. He said that when he joined he had understood that the body was not to take up matters of politics, religion or morals, and that he did not think it had any business taking up the liquor question.

**George P. Lent**, who was lately a candidate for office on the prohibition ticket, reiterated Mr. Watson's sentiments. He said he favored a high license, and that the One Hundred would break up if it did not drop this bill.

# W. W. PLANNING TO CELEBRATE

To Assemble From All Eastern Oregon at Baker City February Twenty-Seven.

**SEVENTEEN CIRCLES WILL PARTICIPATE**  
Grand Lodge Officers Will Attend — Careful Preparation Will Be Under Direction of Special Organizer.

Baker City, Or., Feb. 16.—Plans are being made by the Women of Woodcraft of this district for one of the largest rallies ever held in the state, outside of a grand lodge meeting, to take place here February 27. Seventeen circles are to participate and several hundred members will be in attendance. Mrs. L. A. Derrick of San Francisco, special organizer, is in the city now and will remain with the local circles. Queen of the Forest and Mystic, for some time, instructing them in ritual and drill work in preparation for the big event.

Several grand lodge officers will be in attendance, among them Grand Organizer Miss M. B. Sumner and Grand Guardian Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdale, both of Portland. The officers to preside at the model meeting to be held in the evening of the eventful day are: Guardian neighbor, Mrs. Jackson, of Mystic circle; advisor, Mrs. Stern, of Queen of the Forest; past guardian neighbor, Mrs. Sarah Thompson, Q. F. magician, Mrs. Elizabeth Walla, Elks neighbor, Richen of Gold circle of Sumpter, and three managers and two sentinels to be selected from the North Powder and Haines circles.

When the members of the lodges assemble here a reception will be held in the afternoon from 2 to 5 o'clock. From 5 to 7 o'clock will be devoted to a banquet and the evening to the model session, when drill and ritualistic work will be exemplified for the night.

Three prizes are to be awarded. One will be \$30 for largest representation, another, \$25 for the circle bringing in the largest number of new members between August 1 to February 27, and a gold medal to the lodge whose members bring in the most new members in that time.

Circles to be represented at the Baker City rally will be Sumpter, North Powder, Haines, Prairie City, Burns, La Grande, Elgin, Walla, Walla, Elks, Joseph, Unity, Ontario, Huntington and Canyon City.

**MRS. BALLARD'S SAD DEATH AT THE DALLES**
