SCHOOL CAMPUS TO BE PRESERVED

Streets Will Not Be Extended Through Grounds of Proposed Albina School.

At the meeting of the council street committee yesterday afternoon the petition for an extension of streets through the site for a high school to be built in Albina in the future was laid on the table.

The franchise asked by the Economy Gas company was ordered readjusted. The ordinance was tabled by the council two months ago.

W. J. Burns, who had a bithulicidal character built in front of his residence without having been ordered to do so by the city engineer, asked the committee to repay him the difference between the cost of the walk and the price of a wood walk, such as the city engineer would have ordered.

Mr. Burns said that the bithulicidal character was not needed any further and the petition went into the indefinitely postponed box without discussion.

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CONGREGATIONAL MAKE "YOUR COLOR"

High-Sounding Titles Applied to Them by Attorneys on Hibbard Street Improvement.

PETITION GRANTED BY STREET COMMITTEE

Remonstrators' Lawyer Declares in Vain That Work Will Cost Abutting Property Owners Thirteen Thousand Dollars.

Half of the regularly and self-appointed delegations for and against the improvement of Hibbard street journeyed over from Montavilla to the city hall yesterday afternoon, and everyone of them made the council committee on streets believe that was a senator from Multnomah county, and that there was a fat job or two within his gift.

Cicero Miltiades Idelman, who represented the remonstrators, called back by high lawyer of the city a remonstrance of the days when he was attorney general of the state and gave friendly advice to the governor of Oregon.

H. B. Dickinson, also an attorney, was there on the other side, and for a time he apparently believed that he was talking before the state circuit court sitting en banc. It was fun for the five councilmen, only two of whom are lawyers, to hear themselves addressed as "your honor."

"It was more amusing still for them to hear these words: 'If your honors please we will call—'

Improvement Expensive. "Don't call anybody, unless he wants to buy a load of brick from my yard," laughingly remonstrated Councilman Willis. "We'll use time if we have to hear people talk."

"No, don't do that," chorused Chairman Vaughn and Councilman Masters, who are lawyers, and who had been fighting cases in court all day.

Obeying the warning of the two opposing attorneys out out oratory and got down to straight facts. Idelman said that the improvement of Hibbard street from the Base Line road to Willis street was proposed to cost \$13,000, and would mean an assessment of 10 cents a foot upon all abutting property.

This would cost the owner of a lot more than he paid for it last spring. The proposed street, according to the survey, ended at Villa avenue, and there was nothing at the terminus but a farm. If the street were to be built at all, it should be continued to the O. R. & N. tracks.

"Be careful how you act," said City Attorney McNary in answer to a question as to the legality of the improvement. "If the street will not drain we may have a ditch like we had on Hancock street."

Remonstrators' Loss. "This street will drain," said City Engineer Taylor decisively. "It certainly will," said Dickinson. "There is no reason why the improvement should not be made. A majority of the property-owners have signed the petition. Many of the signers of the remonstrance do not own property along the avenue. The actual frontage on the remonstrance is 778 feet, but if we throw in the wives who signed the document and who haven't any property in the city, the amount runs up to 1,240 feet."

The committee gave Dickinson judgment from the bench. All five of the councilmen voted in favor of the petition and against the remonstrance.
