SAYS HE HURLED RING INTO RIVER

Hotel Clerk Suspected of Jewel Box Robbery Makes Strange Statement.

MARTIN MAY BE ACCUSED OF PERJURY

Jewelry Store Employee Tells Conflicting Stories to Deputy District Attorney Hanev, Who Will Investigate the Case Further.

Al Meyer, the 18-year-old night clerk in the Hotel Carleton, who was arrested yesterday afternoon by Detectives Jones and Mallett on a warrant issued upon complaint of Mrs. Bea Ely, charging him with the theft of a jewel case from her apartment, appeared before Judge Cameron this morning for arraignment. Upon the request of the young defendant the case was continued until Monday for hearing, as he wished to secure the services of an attorney.

H. Martin, an employe of Feidenheimer's jewelry store, whose name has been connected with the case, was examined by Deputy District Attorney Hanev, sitting as a grand jury, yesterday afternoon, and in view of the alleged misstatements made by him a perjury charge may be the result.

According to Meyer's story, after finding the case, he showed the snake ring found in the chest to Martin, and told him the circumstances surrounding the finding of the article. When Meyer ascertained that he might be accused of the theft of the jewelry, he says that in company with Martin he went to the Harrison street bridge and threw the ring into the river. The Crescent stick pin he flung out of the window of his room and the article was subsequently found by the police.

The only evidence against Meyer is the fact that the case and a portion of the stolen jewelry was found in his possession. The only testimony that the police have been able to gather as yet is Mrs. Ely's statement of the dis-

appearance of the chest from her room some time between Thursday and Sunday. Against this is the youth's declaration that he found the case in a vacant room in the Hotel Carleton.

Deputy District Attorney Hanev gives it as his opinion that Martin was not implicated in the crime, but Detectives Jones and Tichenor think otherwise. The remainder of the stolen property has not been recovered and Meyer stoutly maintains that he does not know anything about the missing articles.

NAME CHOSEN IS "CORDRAY"

Proposed East Side Theatre to Be Named for the Manager.

Plans submitted by a New York architect for the new Cordray theatre, which name has been chosen for the east side playhouse, were virtually accepted last night at the East Side club. According to these plans, the Cordray will be one of the finest opera-houses in the northwest.

Pressed brick and concrete will be used in the construction. The stage will be large enough to admit of any production on the road, and the very latest construction ideas in protecting the audience from fire are incorporated in the architect's scheme.

"There is no question about the money part of it," said John F. Cordray this morning, "only the time required to see all who want to take shares is necessary to raise the amount. It is a fact that we are compelled to restrain enthusiastic east sideers from taking the whole amount. But we want as many as possible from all over the east side."

Mr. Cordray is extremely enthusiastic over the project and says that it is the greatest thing that the east side has been offered in the history of Portland. "And let me again dispel any doubt in the minds of any that the project will fail, for we of the inside can assure you that the theatre is not only assured, but a dead certainty," stated Mr. Cordray.

Of the amount required, nearly one-half has been subscribed up to date—practically \$30,000.

EVELYN'S MOTHER MAY TESTIFY

Mrs. Holman Demands That She Be Given Opportunity to Go on Witness Stand.

SEEKS OPPORTUNITY TO REFUTE HER DAUGHTER

Assisting District Attorney in Every Possible Way to Hang Son-in-Law and Prove Her Own Child to Be a Prevaricator.

(Journal Special Service.) New York, Feb. 21.—Mrs. Charles J. Holman, mother of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, will be called as a witness for the state by District Attorney Jerome. Further than this, Mrs. Holman, since the revelations made by Evelyn Nesbit Thaw as a witness, has demanded that she be given an opportunity to publicly refute the insinuations made in the testimony against her and to contradict the story told by Mrs. Thaw as to the proposal of marriage by Harry Thaw in Europe and the reason for her refusal.

Mrs. Holman, in a statement given to a representative of the District Attorney in her home in Pittsburg, stated that Harry Thaw not only did not propose marriage, but she is ready to testify that when she urged him, in view of the gossip which attended their travels in Europe, to marry her daughter, Thaw

became enraged and forcibly ejected her from his apartments.

Mother to Deny Testimony.

Mrs. Holman in her statement alleges that Stanford White never sought an opportunity to harm Evelyn Nesbit, and Mrs. Holman will deny that she was ever persuaded to go to Pittsburg and leave her daughter in charge of White, as Evelyn Nesbit Thaw testified. Mrs. Holman has denied to the district attorney and will testify to it, if called as a witness, that she ever connived in any way to imperil her daughter with Stanford White, and will swear that the first she ever heard of the matter was when she read the testimony given by her daughter.

Mrs. Holman has given to District Attorney Jerome all of the letters which Stanford White sent to her from the time he first became acquainted with Evelyn Nesbit until the latter's marriage, and also the letters which Evelyn Nesbit wrote to her mother concerning Thaw and his alleged cruel treatment. Jerome also has the letters written by Evelyn Nesbit about the relations with Stanford White.

To Attack Her Daughter.

The district attorney has been informed by Mrs. Holman that she is ready to aid him in any way that may be suggested to make clear the real relations between Stanford White and Evelyn Nesbit as she knows them and to attack the credibility of her daughter.

More important, perhaps, than any of the documents which Mrs. Holman has given to the district attorney is another bundle of letters which were given to Mr. Jerome yesterday. They are the letters which were written by Evelyn Nesbit to Stanford White, and most of these are written after the time fixed by Mrs. Thaw in her testimony for the

happening in the White studio. White requested his secretary, C. V. Harriott, to destroy all personal correspondence in case of his sudden death. Mr. Harriott carried out these orders after Mr. White was shot, but the bundle of letters written by Evelyn Nesbit to White were overlooked and will be used by the district attorney in his cross-examination of Mrs. Thaw to show the differences between the written expression of her regard for White and the story she told as a witness.

Maxie Follette, former associate with Evelyn Nesbit in the chorus, is arrayed against the defense, and in a sworn statement given to Assistant District Attorney Garvan recites a number of incidents within her alleged personal knowledge showing the kindness of Stanford White in his treatment of Evelyn Nesbit and the cruel treatment of Harry Thaw.

Miss Follette alleges that on one occasion, at a private dinner in an upper Broadway restaurant, Evelyn Nesbit was sitting at a table talking with friends and Thaw seized her by the hair and dragged her out of the room.

Maxie Follette gave to Mr. Garvan a large amount of information which will be used by Mr. Jerome in his cross-examination of Mrs. Thaw, and, it is said, that Maxie Follette is ready to testify that Evelyn Nesbit told her repeatedly that Stanford White never wronged her in any way.
