

MAJORITY NEW LAWS ARE CREATED

House Spends Busy Day Rushing Measures Through—Feeble-Minded Institute.

ALL MEN ARE FORCED TO SUPPORT SPOUSES

All Salmon Fishermen Must Be Oreganians—Appropriation for Agricultural Experiment Station at Union—Must File Certificates.

(By a Staff Correspondent.) Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—New laws were made at a rapid rate in the house yesterday afternoon, and provided the governor does not step in with his veto after the session has ended and decapitate a few of the efforts, several important actions were taken.

Husbands will not beat their wives or refuse to support them while they themselves live apart and in idleness. The house passed the Sichel bill providing that all men who failed to support their wives should be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction should be confined in the county jail for a period of not less than 30 days, and in the discretion of the court a daily stipend of \$1.50 shall be paid to the family during the time of the prisoner's incarceration.

Other bills passed by the house during the afternoon were: A bill by Malarkey giving a husband an half interest in the estate of a dead wife during his lifetime.

By Johnson, raising the continuing appropriation for maintenance of the Agricultural college from \$25,000 to \$40,000 annually.

By McDonald, providing for an appropriation of \$15,000 for the maintenance of the experimental station at Union. It was stated by the friends of this bill that the station pays \$5,000 annually into the state treasury, but owing to the law none of this sum could be used for the institution.

By Sichel, providing that all fishermen engaged in fishing in the streams of the state shall be residents and citizens of the state.

By Smith of Umatilla, requiring all officials, doctors and nurses to file reports of all births and deaths in the state for purposes of vital statistics.

The bill introduced providing for the repair of the fishway at the falls at Oregon City was passed, but an appropriation of \$24 in favor of Master Fish Warden Van Dusen was stricken out because the same item had been incorporated in the general appropriation bill under another head.

RESTORE FEE SYSTEM Davey Seeks to Put Money Into Secretary of State's Pocket.

(By a Staff Correspondent.) Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—Secretary of State F. W. Benson is to be allowed to revert to the fee system, upon which the state has put the stamp of disapproval, according to house concurrent resolution 21, introduced by Speaker Davey in the house yesterday afternoon. In spite of the fact that the secretary is now supposed to be on a fat salary and to receive no compensation whatever for his services other than the salary provided by statute, it is the intention of Mr. Davey, as set out in the resolution, to allow the secretary "the compensation provided by law for his services in printing the session laws of the present session and the calendar of the house and senate journals."

CORPORATIONS CAN HELP House Kills Corrupt Practices Act by Indefinite Postponement.

(By a Staff Correspondent.) Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—There will be no corrupt-practices bill passed by the present session of the legislature. Yesterday the house killed the Bingham and Coshaw bill by indefinite postponement, thus putting an end to all hope for the passage of such a bill during the present legislature.

FOR SINGING BIRDS House Passes Resolution to Import Feathered Songsters.
