

PAINING FOR SPEED WITH LIFE

Six Will Die of Injuries in Wreck of the Pennsylvania's Swift Flyer.

BROKEN BOLT DROPS BRAKE SHOE ON TRACK

Derailment of Engine and Three Cars Ensnared—Postmaster of Chicago Badly Hurt—Nearly All Passengers Injured.

Johnstown, Pa., Feb. 22.—Ten are missing and half a dozen were fatally hurt and over a score injured in the wreck of the Pennsylvania's west-bound 13-hour flyer No. 39 at Mineral Point, eight miles east of here, early this morning.

DUE TO BROKEN BOLT Brake Shoe Fell and Engine and Three Cars Went Over.

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 22.—About 6 o'clock this morning the St. Louis special arrived here with the survivors of the Mineral Point wreck. Most of the passengers were in bed or partly undressed when the wreck occurred, and escaped with little clothing, which was given them here. All that were able to travel were sent on to Chicago on the special.

Nearly all had more or less serious wounds. Four who were badly injured were taken to the Allegheny General Hospital, among them being W. H. Baker, aged 28, a mechanical engineer, of 1411 Joseph street, Denver.

Officials say the cause of the wreck was that a bolt snapped and a brake shoe slipped under a drive wheel and derailed the engine which pulled three cars off with it.

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 22.—It is now believed none were killed outright in the wreck at Mineral Point. The first

DISTINGUISHED VICTIMS

Postmasters of Chicago and Joliet and Chicago Six-Police Chief.

Chicago, Feb. 22.—A long-distance telephone message from the Altoona, Pennsylvania, hospital, sent by an official of the hospital, says Postmaster Bussie is not fatally hurt. His injuries consist of a broken arm, an abrasion over the right eye, a lacerated scalp and a flesh wound in the thigh.

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FOES OF AILSHIE ACCUSE HIM OF BARGAINING

Instance Alleged of Dealings With Smelter Trust—Gooding in the Fight.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, Feb. 22.—The fight over a federal judge to succeed District Judge James H. Beaty of Idaho waxes exceedingly warm. Charges against Ailshie have been laid before President Roosevelt, saying that Ailshie, an chief justice of the Idaho supreme court, rendered a decision in favor of the Guggenheim smelter trust, conferring with the trust's attorneys before making his ruling.

Senator Dubois of Idaho has failed to get his resolution through the senate providing for an amendment to the federal constitution prohibiting polygamy and requiring all officials to take oath that they are not connected with any institution permitting polygamy.

Dubois had staked out on his anti-polygamy fight and lost when W. E. Borah was elected this year to succeed him in the senate.

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AGITATION AGAINST JAPANESE

Special Hostility to Mikado's Subjects Showing Itself in San Francisco.

Separate Streetcars Said to Be Favored.

No Statement of Satisfaction With Either Passport Clause or Juggling With School Question Has Passed Embassy at Capital.

(Journal Special Service.) Washington, D. C., Feb. 22.—Members of the administration and other officials in Washington who are interested in the satisfactory outcome of negotiations affecting Japanese immigration are somewhat disturbed by rumors that have reached here from San Francisco suggesting special hostility to Japanese subjects in that city.

Officials, while generally discrediting these rumors, deplore further agitation of the Japanese question, pending the settlement which the administration is now effecting. Senator Flint said today:

It is unfortunate that reports of this character should be sent out just at this time, when negotiations for the settlement of the Japanese situation are progressing favorably. President Roosevelt has the matter well in hand and a satisfactory solution seems assured.

This is the official attitude in Washington. But it seems to be a fact, in spite of official assurances, that no statement of satisfaction with either the passport clause or the juggling with the school question has passed through the Japanese embassy here.

Of course, if the senate would call for correspondence on this subject, and the president would transmit it, the entire matter would be cleared up, but it is not likely it will be produced.
