The workmen whose places they were to fill had been receiving \$2.25 and \$2.60 a day, but the visitors declare that they had no knowledge that they were being hired as strikebreakers. They were rounded up by an employment agent, who turned them over to the man from Portland. The latter, they said, merely informed them that the portland mills were "short of hands."
